July 29, 2020 The lesser feast of Mary & Martha of Bethany

Dear Friends in Christ,

Saints Mary and Martha of Bethany rate being included the Saint roster in the



Episcopal Church, but I would argue that they are worthy of a major feast. All the eleven original disciples plus Matthias (the Judas replacement chosen by lottery) are awarded major or red letter feasts. And for some of them we know very little about them other than they were with Jesus from his Baptism through his Resurrection. But with Mary and Martha of Bethany we know that Jesus often stayed with them and their brother Lazarus, whom Jesus raised. Mary sat at Jesus' feet and had deep discussions with him while Martha prepared and served the meals. It is with Mary and Martha that Jesus says, "I am the resurrection and the life. Those who believe in me, even though they die, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?" Martha replies, "Yes, Lord, I believe that you are the Messiah, the Son of God, the one coming into the world." (*John 11:25—27*) They rate a major feast!

It's tempting to try to classify people as either a "Mary," someone who spends time in prayer and scripture, or a "Martha," one who is always engaged in action and good deeds. The truth of the matter is that all of us are a blend of Mary and Martha. In fact our time spent in scripture, prayer and contemplation fuels our active ministries of seeking and serving Christ in all persons and loving our neighbor as ourselves. Especially during this COVID-19 pandemic we all need this spiritual fuel to cope and flourish. So where can it be found?

It's a trick question: you have all the things you need already. Since the weekend of July 5th All Saints' has been offering two small gatherings of 12 person services of Holy Communion: Saturdays at 5 pm and Sundays at 10:30 am. You must call the Rectory phone ahead of time and reserve your place at least an hour before the service. We don't want to turn anyone away at the door. Masks covering mouth and nose, hand-sanitized hands, and 6 feet of physical distance are required. These two in-person worship opportunities and Evening Prayer are also available by Zoom and on All Saints' Facebook page which can be accessed through our webpage. In addition "Dwelling in the Word," Compline, Book Club, PB&B, the Lunch Bunch are all available on Zoom. If you have no computer, you can use your phone and call into Zoom. Or you can even call Deacon Dorothy Pierce or me and we will phone you shortly before the service so you can listen to it! Plus there are *The Book of Common Prayer*, 1979 and *Forward Day by Day* for personal prayer and private devotion. Copies of which can be delivered to you if you call the office.

Thanks go out to other parishoners who also have made desserts. With the sale of Maines, CHOW has dramatically less products for us to use on a weekly basis meaning we buy more. In addition to those who come we deliver food to several shutins. However, our finances remain ok thanks to some legacy money and generous gifts from parishoners.

Volunteers are at a premium, as always. Thanks go to the "regulars": Linda Barkman, Mother Chris, Joy Kasmarcik, and Rick Fiacco who is a, now loyal, second week cook, the Coles, Colleen Labosky, the Pierces, and some dedicated non-parishoners. It takes about 8-10 people to pull a Saturday off. Please consider volunteering or asking any friends you might have to give it a try. I have found that friends I ask have been willing to take a try.

There have been stresses such as an overflowing sump pit, flodding in the hallways, and no elevator for two weeks, but we perservere. God is good and we continue to feed his flock.

THE APOSTLES

ANDREW

Andrew was the brother of Peter, and a son of Jonas. He lived in Bethsaida and Capernaum and was a fisherman before Jesus called him. Originally, he was a disciple of John the Baptist (Mark 1:16-18). Andrew brought his brother, Peter, to Jesus (John 1:40). He is the first to have the title of Home and Foreign Missionary. He is claimed by three countries as their Patron Saint-Russia, Scotland and Greece. Many scholars say that he preached in Scythia, Greece and Asia Minor.

Andrew introduced others to Jesus. Although circumstances placed him in a position where it would have been easy for him to become jealous and resentful, he was optimistic and well content in second place. His main purpose in life was to bring others to the master.

According to tradition, it was in Achaia, Greece, in the town of Patra that Andrew died a martyr. When Governor Aepeas' wife was healed and converted to the Christian faith, and shortly after that the Governor's brother became a Christian. Aepeas was enraged. He arrested Andrew and condemned him to die on the cross. Andrew, feeling unworthy to be crucified on the same-shaped cross as his Master, begged that his be different. So, he was crucified on an X-shaped cross, which is still called Saint Andrew's cross and which is one of his apostolic symbols. A symbol of two crossed fish has also been applied to Andrew, because he was formerly a fisherman.

BOOK CLUB TO MEET DIGITALLY BY ZOOM

ON AUGUST 20th at 5:30PM FINISHING THE NICKEL BOYS... STARTING JUST MERCY

Since *Crossways* will go to press before the July Book Club meeting, saying what the Book Club will be reading is always a challenge. As the Book Club's pace is set by members and that it is summertime, the Book Club in July will be finishing up reading Colson Whitehead's *The Nickel Boys* and moving on to discuss, *Just Mercy: A Story of Justice and Redemption* by Bryan Stevenson.

Here are the publishers' blurb for *Just Mercy*:

Just Mercy: A Story of Justice and Redemption (e-format \$12.99, paperback \$17.99 -7.88) "A powerful true story about the potential for mercy to redeem us, and a clarion call to fix our broken system of justice—from one of the most brilliant and influential lawyers of our time. Bryan Stevenson was a young lawyer when he founded the Equal Justice Initiative, a legal practice dedicated to defending those most desperate and in need: the poor, the wrongly condemned, and women and children trapped in the farthest reaches of our criminal justice system. One of his first cases was that of Walter McMillian, a young man who was sentenced to die for a notorious murder he insisted he didn't commit. The case drew Bryan into a tangle of conspiracy, political machination, and legal brinksmanship—and transformed his understanding of mercy and justice forever.

"Just Mercy is at once an unforgettable account of an idealistic, gifted young lawyer's coming of age, a moving window into the lives of those he has defended, and an inspiring argument for compassion in the pursuit of true justice.

Episcopal Church Executive Council: opening remarks from Presiding Bishop Michael Curry - on July 22, 2020 (virtual)

"You've got the COVID-19 virus, that's a fact. You've got schools trying to figure out, do we open, do we not? Everybody is trying to figure out what is the right thing to do. So, you've got that anxiety. You've got the politics of a face mask, which anyway... You've got that going on. You've got, how do we function in society in this context? And then you've got the reality of racism and white supremacy and re-imagining police. You've got all that going on. It's as though you've already got a fire and then you just take the gasoline of a presidential election and throw it on top of the fire. That's what the fall is going to look like. And we haven't even thought about the fact that we're about to enter into hurricane season.

And so, I take seriously the power of prayer, and I know you do too. And I think we've got to ramp up our prayers during this season in particular, not just here in the United States, but around the world. The tensions and the divisions are real and they're deep. But we need not fall victim to them. And so we will

need to be praying and we'll need to be speaking to make a Christian voice for the way of love and justice and compassion and human decency and adult behavior as values and norms by which we live as human beings, whether we are Christian or Republican or Democrat or any religion."
