28 February 2020 Feast of Anna Julia Haywood Cooper and Elizabeth Evelyn Wright *Educators, 1859-1964, 1872-1904*



Dear Friends in Christ,

Anna Julia Haywood Cooper and Elizabeth Evelyn Wright are two saints who are not part of this year's Lenten Madness, so you won't get a chance to vote for them during Lenten Madness. But like all saints recognized in *Holy Women, Holy Men,* Anna Julia Haywood Cooper's and Elizabeth Evelyn Wright's lives are a witness to their faith and serve as role models for all of us.

Anna Julia Haywood Cooper was born about 1859 in North Carolina to an enslaved woman and a white man, presumed to be her master. She was an American author, educator, sociologist, speaker, Black Liberation activist, and one of the most prominent African-American scholars in United States history. She received degrees from Oberlin College and at the age of 65 completed a doctorate at the Sorbonne, Paris.

Elizabeth Evelyn Wright was born in Georgia in 1872 to an African American father and a Cherokee mother. She was a humanitarian, educator, founder of several schools for black children and founder of the Denmark Industrial Institute which became Voorhees College, South Carolina, a HBCU and affiliated with the Episcopal Church. She received her degree from the Tuskegee Institute.

This year Ash Wednesday, February 26th, the beginning of Lent is about two-thirds of the way through the possible dates possible, February 4-March 10. This has given us seven Sundays of Epiphany, the season of light and revelation—a wonderful contrast to the six weeks self-examination, repentance, prayer, fasting, reading and meditating of Lent. I invite you to the observance of a holy Lent.



Part of the "invitation to a holy Lent" on Ash Wednesday asks Christians to consider observing Lent by self-examination and repentance, by prayer and



and fasting and self-denial, and by reading and meditating on God's holy Word. One can do all the above by attending this year's Lenten Program: The Way: Walking in the Footsteps of Jesus on Sundays at 5:00pm beginning Sunday, March 1st. The program will continue Sundays March 8th, March15th, March 22nd, March 29th, and April 5th. Each session will begin with a simple bread and soup supper in the Library followed by the program. The evening will conclude with a Taize Compline in the Chapel at 7:00pm.

The Way, using a book and video, invites you to travel with Adam Hamilton as he retraces the life and ministry of Jesus Christ in his last week. Fascinating video from his personal travels to the Holy Land give you a "first-person" experience while his biblical wisdom and historical knowledge provide

thoughtful and insightful commentary. We'll be using the new Expanded Large-Print edition which includes devotions for each chapter and photos from Adam's trip to the Holy Lands.

Apostle: James

James, the Elder, Boanerges, son of Zebedee and Salome, brother of John the Apostle; a fisherman who lived in Bethsaida, Capernaum and Jerusalem. He preached in Jerusalem and Judea and was beheaded by Herod, AD 44 (Acts 12:1,2). He was a member of the Inner Circle, so called because they were accorded special privileges. The New Testament tells us very little about James. His name never appears apart from that of his brother, John. They were an inseparable pair (Mark 1:19-20; Matthew 4:21; Luke 5:1-11).

He was a man of courage and forgiveness, a man without jealousy, living in the shadow of John, a man of extraordinary faith. He was the first of the twelve to become a martyr. His symbol is three shells, the sign of his pilgrimage by the sea.



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BOOK CLUB TO MEET MARCH 25th AT 5:30 PM AT THE RECTORY: FINISHING PASSIONATE FOR JUSTICE: IDA B. WELLS AS A PROPHET FOR OUR TIME AND STARTING ????

Since the Ash Wednesday meeting of the Book Club will be the first one to discuss *Passionate for Justice: Ida B. Wells as a Prophet for our Time* and it will happen after the March *Crossways* goes to press, the Book Club will either be finishing up, *Passionate for Justice* or starting a new book. Here's the publisher's blurb for *Passionate for Justice*:

"[Ida B. Well's] life is a profound witness for faith-based work of visionary power, resistance, and resilience for today's world, when the forces of injustice stand in opposition to progress.

"These are exciting and dangerous times. Boundaries that previously seemed impenetrable are now being crossed. This book is a guide for the current state of affairs in American culture, enlivened by the historical perspective of Wells' search for justice.

The authors are an African American woman and a child of white supremacy. Both have dedicated themselves to working, writing, and developing ministries oriented toward justice, equity, and mercy. ""

The All Saints' Learning Community Initiatives (LCI) Team wants to qualify and quantify the growth and transformation that is a result of Learning Community Initiatives. At present the LCI Team has only observed or heard about in antidotes the following:

- That many in the congregation after a number of sessions of "Dwelling in the Word" in lieu of a sermon may now be listening more intently to the Scripture readings at other worship services;
- That some in the congregation continue to engage in the Scripture even afterwards by discussing points with others in the congregation after the services;
- That some who participate in the weekly sessions of "Dwelling in the Word" have changed the way they read Scripture in their private spiritual practices—it has deepened their spiritual life; and
- Still others in the congregation hate "Dwelling in the Word" and "Listening to Others" and share their feelings about the Learning Community Initiatives with others which doesn't help the process.

As the Learning Experiment has worked well to enable people to write their prayers on Prayer Scarves, the LCI Team has decided to do something similar to gather feedback about "Dwelling in the Word" and "Listening to Others": a LCI Flag! The weekend after the next "Dwelling in the Word" in lieu of sermon session, parishioners will be encouraged to write on a flag pennant and express their thoughts. For example, perhaps:

- Dwelling in the Word has changed the way I hear scripture, or
- I like Dwelling in the Word because of the insights I hear from others, or
- Dwelling in the Word is difficult for me because there is too little time to share, or
- I wish we could do Dwelling in the Word outside of worship because...

You get the idea. For those suffering from writer's block there'll be a list of nouns, descriptors and feelings so the word-blocked writer is able to fill-in-the-blank.



Our Lenten special offering supports our Saturday Soup and Sandwiches Lunch Program. The

number of people we serve keeps going up with most weeks having about 60-70 participants and a few weeks we served over 90! We are sure that there are many folks who have

come to depend on our program. My hope is that we can again raise enough money to continue without busting the church's budget.

This is how it works. Many people give something up during Lent. For example, chocolate, or between meal snacks, or their daily lottery ticket. The money saved is put into a soup box (provided by the Sunday School) and collected on Easter Day. In the narthex you will find "Soup Boxes" created by our Church School Program. All monies collected go toward the funds used to provide lunches every Saturday.

PALM SUNDAY WEEKEND LITURGY ON APRIL 4TH AT 5:00 PM & ON APRIL 5TH AT 10:00 AM BEGINS WITH A PROCESSION AND THE JOURNEY CONTINUES USING PROJECTED IMAGES AND DRAMA

On Palm Sunday Jesus began his Passion by a triumphal entry into Jerusalem. Come and join the choir and church school in the singing of "All Glory Laud and Honor" as we process around the church. Throughout the service paintings and artwork depicting Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem and the Passion will be projected on to the wall of the chancel—you'll want to sit off the center aisle to get the best view of the images. After the Collect and lessons from the Old and New Testaments, Prayers of the People, the Peace and Offertory, the dramatic reading of the Passion of Our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke will begin.

When the Passion reading reaches the Last Supper, we will pause to celebrate Holy Communion surrounded by depictions of the Upper Room. Following Communion, the dramatic reading of the Passion will continue. The liturgy will end with a solemn blessing and dismissal from the Book of Occasional Services. This year the Southern Tier East District's Great Vigil of Easter will be held at All Saints' at 8:00 PM! During the Liturgy of the Word art work will be projected. Then when "Gloria" begins and the lights come on in the chancel the first Eucharist of Easter will be celebrated. The Rev. Dcn. Dorothy Pierce, District Deacon, will sing the "Exsultet," proclaim the Gospel and serve at the altar. Con-celebrating the Eucharist will be Mother Chris and Mother Elizabeth and Father Jim from Christ Church. The following is a <u>link directly to Safe Church</u> which some of our parishioners need to complete once every five years.

Who Should Be Trained?

All members of our churches are encouraged to participate in Safe Church Training. The more informed and aware we are, the safer our churches will be for all children and adults.

Individuals who complete the three-hour Safe Church Training workshop are awarded a certificate. Certification is valid for five years and may be renewed by attending the workshop again or completing Safeguarding Online. The following individuals are required to have up-to-date Safe Church certificates:

- Clergy
- Vestry members
- Parish employees
- Worship Leaders, Lay Ministers & Eucharistic Visitors
- Anyone volunteering or working with children in any capacity

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All Youth Leaders under the age of 16 are **required to attend** <u>Safe Church for Teens</u> <u>training annually</u>, and all youth in the Diocese are encouraged to take this training.


