Dear Friends in Christ,



This week always reminds me of the baptism of my godson, William Christopher Konzen (always called Chris) thirty-years ago on the Feast of St. Mark's at the then St. Paul's Cathedral at the weekday Eucharist. It was a weekday Eucharist because Chris' father was the organist at a Presbyterian Church—and could not be present on a Sunday. It was the then St. Paul's Cathedral because that chapel had an organ, and a friend could play the organ for what would have been a spoken service only. But the most important thing was that Christopher was baptized and welcomed into the household of God. That welcome thirty-five years ago has accompanied Chris throughout his life as he and his family moved from Syracuse, NY to Pittsburgh, PA to New Bern, NC to college and so far, to Florida.

One of the delights of parish ministry is being the officiant at baptisms and watching the children grow in faith. They grow in faith through the examples of parents, family members, church school teachers and their church family and sometimes multiple church families. Thank you for your prayers and witness with God's help that has helped many generations of children grow into the full stature of Christ.

As we approach Pentecost, May 23rd think about baptism: your baptism, your children's, grandkids', godchildren's baptisms, and your Baptismal vows. For on the Vigil for and Pentecost, May 22nd and 23rd, we'll have a chance to renew our Baptismal Covenant. Sure, red will be worn, there will be red streamers and we'll hear the story of the first Pentecost and hear about the gift of the Holy Spirit. But it is also a time to celebrate that we are the Body of Christ in the world; God's children; inheritors of the Kingdom of God; and have received forgiveness of sins and new life in the Holy Spirit. Wear red and let the Spirit do its work!

Vestry Synopsis for April

- > Tom Johnson reported the pledges are holding steady.

- Gary Zurn presented the Property Task Force report comprised of the church insurance claims, the report from Dennis Cole and quotes from Weathermaster Roofing for repair work for the two insurance claims. The quotes to do the two claims repair work were higher than the initial claims adjuster calculated by The Church Insurance Company, Gary Zurn is negotiating for addition insurance monies from The Church Insurance Company. There were several other additional areas of concern that the Vestry is studying, especially the steps.
- > Motion was made and past that Weathermaster be contacted and a contract executed.
- > S&SS received the Diocesan grant for disposables.



VESTRY AND PROPERTY COMMITTEE REPORT ON WINTER STORM DAMAGE

While most people were not able to be in the building due to COVID three separate winter storms caused considerable damage to All Saints' this past winter. The Christmas Eve storm caused water to overflow the gutters and drain spout which flooded the Christian Ed Room and the area in the "Old Choir Room." The water damaged the walls in these areas. Late on Christmas Eve Gary Zurn used PVC piping from the Rectory garage re-directed much water away from Church and Debbie and Don Thorpe shop-vacuumed the Christian Ed Room and the "Old Choir Room" on Christmas Day.

Then late January and early February snowstorms caused a huge ice dam which forced water through the roof and down the walls in the area of where the nave meets the room outside the library. The first week of February, after the damaging water from the ice dam was discovered and collecting buckets of water per day inside the Church from the ceiling, men from Blanding Electric cleared the roof of snow and used ice melt on the ice.

As when damage occurs in one's home, Church Insurance Company and Weathermaster Roofing Company were contacted by the Property Committee on behalf of the Vestry for help. The property committee consists of Dennis Cole, Rick Hrebin, Matt Labosky, Don Thorpe Gary Zurn, and ex officio, Wardens Tom Johnson and Judy Horton. Considerable work must be done:

- West-side roof and gutters
- West-side basement
- South-side roof, gutters, and scupper
- South-side basement and
- church "walk-thru" area, room outside of the Library.

The total cost for the repair of the damage of the three winter storms to the Church is **\$39,079.36**. Since the damaged roof, gutters, drain spouts cannot keep the weather—rain, snow, and ice—out of the building, these are All Saints' most vital needs at this time. We have received insurance checks to cover some of the damage but not all. We have also engaged Weathermaster Roofing to fix the roof area that caused the damages in those areas. You should see work on the exterior in the near future. However, we do not have a quote on the work inside the church, which includes damage to the outside area of the Christian Education room as well as to the Christian Education room, the hallway to where the Scouts keep their items nor to the damage just as you leave the sanctuary to go to the library.

In addition, we have had the steps at the two entrances to the church (Parking Lot entrance and the Third Street entrance where Soup and Sandwich people enter) assessed and they are in terrible condition. It is why there is a caution tape across the steps to the main entrance. The

ramp is ok but not the steps. The steps are unsafe to use. The steps in both locations need to be rebuilt from the ground up. The old coal chute also must be blocked up as a safety issue. The cost of repairing the steps at both entrances and the old coal chute is projected to be between **\$7,000 and \$10,000**.


At press time, the Vestry is working on plans to fund these much needed repairs and the existing parking lot project. These plans will include the use of the insurance funds, solicitation of multi-year capital improvement pledges, applying to the Diocesan Foundation, other grants, and potential loans from the Diocesan Foundation and/or Episcopal Church Building Fund. Stay tuned!

BOOK CLUB READING: MEACHAM'S *HIS TRUTH IS MARCHING ON* THURSDAY MAY 27th at 5:30 PM

This May, the Book Club will be continuing to read Jon Meacham's book about John Lewis, *His Truth is Marching On: John Lewis and the Power of Hope*. The pace of the reading is set by the members. Book Club usually meets monthly on the last Wednesday during the fall, winter, and spring. But once "Golf" season begins the Book Club meets on the last THURSDAY of the month. Therefore, the next meeting of the Book Club will be on Thursday, May 27th at 5:30pm by ZOOM.

Here's the publisher's blurb for *His Truth is Marching On: John Lewis and the Power of Hope*: "#1 *NEW YORK TIMES* BESTSELLER • An intimate and revealing portrait of civil rights icon and longtime U.S. congressman John Lewis, linking his life to the painful quest for justice in America from the 1950s to the present—from the Pulitzer Prize– winning author of *The Soul of America* NAMED ONE OF THE BEST BOOKS OF THE YEAR BY *THE WASHINGTON POST* AND *COSMOPOLITAN*

"John Lewis, who at age twenty-five marched in Selma, Alabama, and was beaten on the Edmund Pettus Bridge, was a visionary and a man of faith. Drawing on decades of wideranging interviews with Lewis, Jon Meacham writes of how this great-grandson of a slave and son of an Alabama tenant farmer was inspired by the Bible and his teachers in nonviolence, Reverend James Lawson and Martin Luther King, Jr., to put his life on the line in the service of what Abraham Lincoln called "the better angels of our nature." From an early age, Lewis learned that nonviolence was not only a tactic but a philosophy, a biblical imperative, and a transforming reality. At the age of four, Lewis, ambitious to become a minister, practiced by preaching to his family's chickens. When his mother cooked one of the chickens, the boy refused to eat it—his first act, he wryly recalled, of nonviolent protest. Integral to Lewis's commitment to bettering the nation was his faith in humanity and in God—and an unshakable belief in the power of hope.

"Meacham calls Lewis "as important to the founding of a modern and multiethnic twentieth- and twenty-first-century America as Thomas Jefferson and James Madison and Samuel Adams were to the initial creation of the Republic itself in the eighteenth century." A believer in the injunction that one should love one's neighbor as oneself, Lewis was arguably a saint in our time, risking limb and life to bear witness for the powerless in the face of the powerful. In many ways he brought a still-evolving nation closer to realizing its ideals, and his story offers inspiration and illumination for Americans today who are working for social and political change.""



"So, what did you hear?" the doctor asked.


"I've decided to change my will three times already," the man answered.





Wisdom: Proverbs 4: 1-10– "My children, Listen to me. Listen to your father's instruction. Pay attention and grow wise, for I am giving you good guidance. Don't turn away from my teaching. For I, too, was once my father's son, tenderly loved by my mother as an only child.

My father told me, "Take my words to heart. Follow my instructions and you will live. Learn to be wise and develop good judgment. Don't forget or turn away from my words. Don't turn your back on wisdom, for she will protect you....."

Parents generally do all they can to meet the physical, emotional, and educational needs of their children. Proverbs suggest that the most important asset we can impart to our children is the hunger for wisdom. Unlike intelligence, personality, and talent, wisdom is not in our genetic makeup; we must learn it from God. We begin to be wise when we are reverent toward God and his Word. Parents who teach wisdom and model good judgment leave their children an inheritance that is life giving—and far more valuable than gold.
