From the Wardens

Rev. Liz Groskoph will be with us on November 7<sup>th</sup> and 21<sup>st</sup> and provide Holy Eucharists. The Rev. John Martinichio will provide us with Holy Eucharist on November 6<sup>th</sup>, 13<sup>th</sup>, 20<sup>th</sup> and 27<sup>th</sup>. The Rev. Richard Schaal will provide Holy Communion on November 13<sup>th</sup> and Christmas Eve at 5:00 pm. There will be no 11:00 pm service on Christmas Eve.

Judy and I and the rest of the Vestry recently had a discussion with Canon Carrie Broadbent-Schofield via zoom to discuss concerns we have relating to our New Rector Search Process. I had sent her some questions via e-mail concerning the Process that I wanted her to review prior to our zoom session. The next morning, I called her to have a separate discussion about my written questions. As a result of that phone call, we developed the following questions that I shared with the Vestry. Canon Carrie suggested that the Vestry meet with our parishioners individually and/or in small groups to discuss the questions in a Q & A format, and to note their responses. After a few weeks, the Vestry are going to compile the results of our sessions to see what our parishioners feel about All Saints. Initially the Vestry's plan was to spend some time during our upcoming services (morning and evening prayer) to have a short Q&A session on the questions. Additionally, we were going to resume having coffee hour after the 10:00am morning service to discuss our questions. Judy and I found out very quickly in October that attendance at coffee hour was well attended when Holy Eucharist was celebrated, and not so well attended for Morning Prayer Service. We also found out that these questions elicited quite a bit of conversation and trying to do this during worship service might not be practical.

We have decided to continue trying to have conversations during coffee hour for the rest of October and during November. We also decided to send an e-mail to parish members listing the questions and asking for members to respond by e-mail or by mail to either Tom Johnson or to All Saints (c/o Linda Barkman in the Parish Office). Here are the questions concerning the Search for a new Rector:

- (1) Why are you here at All Saints, and What keeps you coming back?
- (2) What one thing should absolutely NOT be changed at All Saints?
- (3) What do you think God wants us (the parish) to be?
- (4) What do you think God calling us (the parish) to do?

Please take some time to consider the questions and send your replies detailing what you think they mean for All Saints. This is important as your collective responses will help shape the future for All Saints.

The **actual start time is 6:30 PM** but those who wish to connect earlier, and chat are welcome to do so from 6:00 - 6:30 pm.

If you see something that needs fixing at the church or the rectory, please see one of the following members of the committee – Dennis Cole, Rick Hrebin, Matt Labosky or Gary Zurn. If you have questions, please see any of the Property Committee members, members of the Vestry or the Wardens.

Landscaping has been completed. It has already proved itself as the heavy rains did not put any water into the basement.

FE Jones has been approved to replace the doors where Soup & Sandwich people enter. It will be 4-6 weeks minimum as it is a special-order door due to size. It will be metal.

Check from the Diocese has arrived to cover the insurance deductible on the theft of the video equipment.

We also have four toilets that need to be repaired with estimated cost of \$800.

BOCES students will be gaining work experience blocking in the old coal chute in the basement. Starting October 25 for 3 weeks on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday each of the weeks from 8-3pm.

Weathermaster will return to fix the leaking gutter in the corner of the library facing Home Depot. The endcap is split. They missed that the first time, but the rain recently found it still leaked.

Blanding Electric will be here on November 2 at 8:00 am to install heat tapes and to fix the exterior lights around the church. This will allow us to present a better picture to surrounding area and any priest driving by to examine our church.

Bodek Plumbing will be here on November 4 mid-morning to give us an estimate to repair the four toilets that are not working. We have one estimate, and they will provide a second. If anyone would like to donate to fixing the toilets enter a note in the memo line of your check.

We need someone to water the new sod along the front of the church on Tuesdays and Fridays. Don Thorpe can't do Fridays for a while because Debbie and he have COVID, and I am out of town on Tuesdays. We especially need water on the farthest corner of the church towards Home Depot. The hose is not quite long enough.

The following is after an inspection at the rectory:

#### **INTERIOR ISSUES:**

- Minimum of seven receptacles reverse polarity
- GFI at front bath wont trip
- GFI recommended in attic space
- One or more unprotected lights in attic
- Loose light fixture in attic
- Evidence of water penetration in attic
- Buckets, daylight at plumbing vent pipe, stains in attic
- No handrail at the attic stairs
- Ventilation is limited in the attic
- Improper connection from water softener line to waste line- should be to a trapped standpipe
- Signs of leakage and rust at the Cast Iron waste lines
- Vent connector for water heater should be screwed together
- Rust on the boiler vent pipe indicates poor venting
- Old boiler with corrosion and rust at heat exchanger
- Broken glass at temperature and pressure gauge
- Possible asbestos on the boiler distribution button piping
- Double header near the basement stairs should have a post
- Termite evidence in the basement
- Evidence of water penetration in the basement
- Railing is loose at stairs to the second floor
- Stair deficiencies to basement, weak handrail
- Stains at living room floor, stains at carpet- second floor
- Fireplace- needs inspection
- Fogged glass at various windows

#### **EXTERIOR ISSUES:**

- Missing mortar at chimney crown
- Vegetation in chimney

- Chimney shows signs of leaking in the attic
- Pipe boot cracked at plumbing vent pipe
- Duck seal needs repair at electric meter
- Front porch needs repairs
- Sub-standard grading, window wells recommended
- Dryer vent hood loose
- South side brick mortar needs repair
- Some of the aluminum siding needs repair
- · Roof appears old
- Debris in gutters
- Some short downspout extensions
- Gap below the garage door
- Driveway is in poor condition

#### **VETERANS DAY**

Then God said, "Let us make humankind in our own image, in our likeness, and let them be stewards over the fish of the sea and the birds of the air, over the livestock, over all the earth, and over all the creatures that move along the ground." In fact, over everything! (Gen. 1:26-28, paraphrase)

We Christians have grown accustomed to hearing preachers tell us that God gave us "dominion" over all of his creation. But I sometimes wonder if we take God seriously. Service members in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard all protect the freedoms we cherish. What are those freedoms? Well, there are the freedoms so nobly expressed by President James Madison in the first ten amendments of the U.S. Constitution, what we call "The Bill of Rights." Then there are the freedoms President Franklin Delano Roosevelt declared in a major speech during the Great Depression, later immortalized by Norman Rockwell in his "Four Freedoms" paintings: Freedom from want, Freedom of speech, Freedom to Worship, and Freedom from fear. All of these freedoms are encapsulated in the 1949 United Nations Declaration of Human Rights. But what about those freedoms we take for granted or treat as if they are rights: home ownership, jobs, health care, public education, and transportation? Only in America are these blessings all but guaranteed.

We live in an age of "entitlement," as it's called. We go about our daily routines in a free and open society, never stopping to think how our lifestyles are secured. Just as the blessed Apostle Paul reminds us that we are not our own, but "were bought with a price," in reference to the sacrifice of Jesus on the cross (1Corinthians 6:20), so it is that our freedoms as citizens were purchased with the lives of patriots and the blood of warriors who willingly gave up the amenities we enjoy. For this we should be grateful.

With the freedoms come responsibilities. When Adam and Eve were in the garden, their "original sin" came in the form of their choosing willfulness over obedience. They quickly forgot God's instructions and began to behave as freedom meant license. However, true freedom is God's service (BCP, 99).

True freedom comes from obedience to the God who makes us stewards over everything, not that we should be dictators or abusers, but servants.

# REQUEST FROM DEACON DOROTHY PIERCE: JAIL MINISTRY NEEDS FOR CHRISTMAS AND WINTER

To Our All-Saints' Family,

As we approach the Christmas/Holiday season and think about our brothers and sisters who are residing at the Broome County Jail, we can be certain that this will be an extraordinary season of compassionate giving. You have always been amazingly generous in your care for the men and women who are at the jail. I am forever grateful to God and to you for your gifts, donations, prayers, and the faithful, loving thoughts you send their way. Thank you so much! We will continue to prepare gift bags to hand out close to Christmas Eve Day for every person incarcerated at the jail regardless of his or her faith background, tradition, or practice. The biggest needs are for decks of playing cards, small puzzle books, and current devotionals (small and paperback). We also pass out stamped Christmas/Holiday cards to every individual early in December so that they can send them to their family and friends. These cards should be blank and simply placed in their envelopes, unsealed, and stamped, so that each person can write a message of love and hope to people who are important to them. We like to give out two or more of these cards to every person in the facility. The facility has over five hundred beds. You can leave these items at the church or call me at 607-624-1523, and I will pick them up at your convenience. Thank you!

We are sadly unable to collect, prepare, and deliver gifts to the children of the men and women at the jail this year because of the pandemic. Hopefully, at a later date, we can surprise the children with gifts, which I will ask for when the time arises. We do have ongoing needs for personal hygiene items which we can accept and give out to persons as they are being released from the jail. These items may include shampoo, toothpaste, combs, deodorant, soap, small Kleenex packs, and shaving items. Throughout the year, we always need sweatsuits (any sizes), socks, and underwear. All these items can be left at the church - or I will arrange to have them picked up at your home. Again, thank you so much! It is God's gift to us to be able to share with others with peace, love, and hope.

I am eternally grateful for all you do to spread love and hope to the men and women at the jail. Many are lonely, feeling lost and sad, and disconnected from family and friends, especially at this time of isolation and not being able to have visits. Your gifts help to bring the love of Jesus Christ to all of them, no matter who they are, and are deeply appreciated and treasured.







Keep watch, dear Lord, with those who work, or watch, or weep this night, and give your angels charge over those who sleep. Tend the sick, Lord Christ, give rest to the weary, bless the dying, sooth the suffering, pity the afflicted, shield the joyous: and all for your love's sake. Amen.



Complacency: Revelation 3:15-17 –I know all the things you do, that you are neither hot nor cold. I wish you were one or the other!.....

Deuteronomy 1: 41-42 – "Then you confessed, 'We have sinned against the LORD! We will go into the land and fight for it as the LORD our God has told us.' So, your men strapped on their weapons, thinking it would be easy to conquer the hill country.'

But the Lord said to me, "Tell them not to attack, for I will not go with them. If they do, they will be crushed by their enemies."

The people of Israel had refused to trust God to help them defeat the enemy. They had taken a casual complacent view of God's ability to help them. Now they believed they could defeat the enemy easily on their own. Their complacency about God's ability to help kept them from winning the battle. This complacency also kept them in the wilderness for the next 38 years. We must be careful not to take God's help lightly. Complacency is a form of arrogance on our part; we forget how much we need God.
