

This means we began the month of August 2013 <u>\$13,470 in the red</u>! Consequently, pledge statements will be issued for all who are behind on their pledge. Please try to keep up your pledges. 

REPAYMENT OF THE UNIFIED INVESTMENT FUND (UIF) UNRESTRICTED RESERVE FUND In 2012 All Saints' used \$30,000 from its Unrestricted Reserve Fund held as part of the Diocesan Unified Investment Fund (UIF). The Vestry is committed to restoring the \$30,000 as quickly as possible. As a result, funds received towards this purpose and towards Rebuilding All Saints' (RAS), will be transferred to the Unrestricted Reserve Fund as soon as the cash flow allows. In July 2013 \$1,942 was transferred into the UIF Unrestricted Reserve Fund. This brings the total amount restored to the Unrestricted Reserve Fund up to \$ 17,949

Vestry Coffee Hour & Forums held on August 17-18 Thoughts about a Memorial Garden & Very, Very, Very, Tentative Draft of Possible Capital & Repair and Maintenance Projects


Thanks to the hospitality of Dave & Judy Horton, the Vestry held two Coffee Hour & Forums after Holy Eucharist on Saturday, August 17 and Sunday August 18, 2013. Yummy treats were consumed while vestry members presented the Memorial Garden plans and led a discussion about very, very, very tentative possible capital and repair and maintenance projects.

Work has continued on a possible plan for All Saints' Memorial Garden. The Memorial Garden Committee and Vestry are proposing the creation of a Memorial Garden for those members who wish to have their cremated remains buried on the church grounds. A Memorial Garden is NOT a cemetery and thus is not regulated as a cemetery. A Memorial Garden is a Church <u>garden</u> with a set-apart section in which the cremated ashes, in a container or urn, are placed in a 1' by 1' "plot" 31 inches into the ground, and covered by grass. It is a tangible symbol of the communion of saints—most fitting for a Church which commemorates All Saints. A burial charge for the cremating of \$500 would cover cost and maintenance of the "plot" and could be waived at the discretion of the Rector.

The proposed area for the Memorial Garden is in the "U-shaped" area, next to the building, between the main entrance/coat room and the library measuring 28' long by 13 feet deep. (See sketch below) In other words, just outside the Main Street windows of the church near the dogwood tree.

Each burial of cremated remains will be marked by a flat 1 ½ inch round marker. A plaque on which the names and dates are inscribed will be <u>inside</u> the church, probably in the narthex. The Memorial Garden will have some benches, so people can sit and meditate. Existing perennial flower border will be expanded and pots of annuals will be placed near two adjacent benches.

It is hoped that a free-standing self-contained fountain in the north-east corner of the Memorial Garden may be installed, which symbolizes our Baptism in living water and is often comforting to the bereaved. The boundaries of the Memorial Garden will be marked by the walls of the church and a "No-Dig" 3 foot aluminum fence which will be 13'from the north wall of the church.





At the March 2013 Vestry meeting, Matt Labosky and Scott Cramer of the Property & Grounds Committee presented the Vestry with a very detailed report about the condition of the church property. While at the time All Saints' is unable to start any capital or repair and maintenance project until the funds are restored to the Diocesan-held United Investment Fund Unrestricted Cash Reserve, it is important to begin thinking about future property and grounds needs and projects.

At the August 2013 Vestry meeting, after four months of discussing the Property & Grounds report, the Vestry ranked the various items using dots: green dots for capital projects and yellow dots for repair and maintenance projects. The following are two lists, in ranked order, for possible future capital and repair and maintenance projects.

Book Club to Meeting Wednesday, September 25th at 5:30 PM at the Rectory: Reading *Call the Midwife III* or *The Faith Club*?

The September meeting of the Book Club will be Wednesday, September 25th at 5:30 PM at the Rectory. As Book Club meets the 4th Wednesday of the month—right when *Crossways* is going to press—it is sometimes impossible to announce what the next book will be. At the August meeting, we are discussing the second book by Jennifer Worth in the *Call the Midwife* series: *In the Shadow of the Workhouse*.

Possible selections for the September meeting are: *Call the Midwife: Farewell to the East End* (last book in the series by Jennifer Worth) and *The Faith Club* (by Ranya Idiby, Suzanne Oliver and Pricilla Warner). Here are the publisher blurbs:

1. Call the Midwife: Farewell to the East End

"When twenty-two-year-old Jennifer Worth, from a comfortable middle-class upbringing, went to work as a midwife in the poorest section of postwar London, she not only delivered hundreds of babies and touched many lives, she also became the neighborhood's most vivid chronicler. *Call the Midwife: Farewell to the East End* is the last book in Worth's memoir trilogy, which the *Times Literary Supplement* described as "powerful stories with sweet charm and controlled outrage" in the face of dire circumstances.

"Here, at last, is the full story of Chummy's delightful courtship and wedding. We also meet Megan'mave, identical twins who share a browbeaten husband, and return to Sister Monica Joan, who is in top eccentric form. As in Worth's first two books, *Call the Midwife: A Memoir of Birth, Joy, and Hard Times and Call the Midwife: Shadows of the Workhouse*, the vividly portrayed denizens of a postwar East End contend with the trials of extreme poverty—unsanitary conditions, hunger, and disease—and find surprising ways to thrive in their tightly knit community.

2. The Faith Club

"A groundbreaking book about Americans searching for faith and mutual respect, The Faith Club weaves the story of three women, their three religions, and their urgent quest to understand one another.

"When an American Muslim woman befriends two other mothers, one Jewish and one Christian, they decide to educate their children about their respective religions. None of them guessed their regular meetings would provide life-changing answers and form bonds that would forever alter their struggles with prejudice, fear, and anger. Personal, powerful, and compelling, *The Faith Club* forces readers to face the tough questions about their own religions.

"Pioneering, timely, deeply thoughtful, and full of hope, *The Faith Club's* caring message will resonate with people of all faiths."
