Dear Friends in Christ,

Oscar Romero and the martyrs of El Salvador, the Annunciation of Our Lord, Richard Allen, Charles Henry Brent, John Keble, Innocent of Alaska, and John Donne: these are the saints' days which have been either dropped or transferred to make way for Palm Sunday, Holy Week and Easter. The ultimate feast of Our Lord, Easter and the week preceding trumps everything else—even the Annunciation of Our Lord! Since in a "normal" week in Lent, the Annunciation of Our Lord is considered a "major" feast, its celebration is transferred to beyond the octave of Easter, to April 8th. The others are usually dropped for the year.



What a shame! Richard Allen (1760-1831), born a slave, was the first Bishop of the African Methodist Episcopal Church. Charles Henry Brent (1862-1929) ordained in Canada was elected by the Episcopal Church House of Bishops as the Missionary Bishop of the Philippines, crusaded against the opium trade, in later life became Bishop of Western New York and a leader in the cause of Christian Unity. John Keble (1792-1866) preached a sermon in 1833 which began the Oxford Movement. Innocent of Alaska, John Venianov, of the Church in Russia, (1797-1879) volunteered to be a missionary to the Aleutian Islands and beyond to the main land. John Donne (1573-1631) in his time was the best preacher in the Church of England, Dean of St. Paul's Cathedral and the poet who wrote, "Any man's death diminishes me, because I am involved in mankind. And therefore never send to know for whom the bell tolls: It tolls for thee."

But because El Salvador is the companion diocese of our Diocese of Central New York Oscar Romero's (1917-1980) remembrance was included in the Prayers of the People on Palm Sunday, March 24th, his feast day. After attending seminary in Rome, Romero worked among the poor in El Salvador. When he was appointed bishop, radicals distrusted his conservative and traditional sympathies. After he was appointed Archbishop of San Salvador, a progressive friend of his, Fr. Rutilio Grande, SJ was assassinated by the government. From that time on, Romero began protesting the government's injustice to the poor and its policies of torture. His sermons were broadcast in El Salvador and he became the voice of the oppressed. He met with Pope John Paul II in 1980 telling him that the leaders of El Salvador were engaged in terror and assassinations. He also pleaded with the US government to stop military aid to El Salvador to no avail. On March 23, 1980 he preached a sermon in the cathedral calling on soldiers to disobey orders that violated human rights. He had said, "A bishop will die, but the Church of God which is the people will never perish." The next day Romero was shot to death while celebrating mass at a small chapel at the hospice where he lived near the cathedral. Blessed Oscar Romero is a most fitting saint for Holy Week and for the celebration of Our Lord's resurrection, Easter.

No Confession During Easter?

O the joy of being Anglican! There's a rubric and reason for every liturgical season. It has become a custom of the Church to omit the confession during the season of Easter (Easter-Easter7). Dr. Marion J. Hatchette explains, "Confession is the obverse of thanksgiving; to give thanks for redemption is to acknowledge one's sinfulness." On the great festival days of the Church year, when it may be more appropriate not to make explicit acts of confession, this is allowed by the rubric, "On occasion, the Confession may be omitted." "(pg. 342, *Commentary on the American Prayer Book*, referring to pg. 359, *Book of Common Prayer, 1979*) The Sundays of the Easter Season are the "great festival days of the Church year. In some ways, this is a return to the practices of the early church where there was no confession in the liturgy and one acknowledged one's sinfulness by giving thanks to God, in the Eucharistic prayer, for redemption. Confession was added to celebrations of the Eucharist during the late Middle Ages. This is a long way of saying, IT'S OKAY TO TAKE COMMUNION WITHOUT CONFESSION DURING THE EASTER SEASON!

Easter Day 2013: A Reflection on John 20:1-18 from Bishop Skip

Dear People of Central New York

This morning I held in my prayer several people of our Diocese known to me who have recently died. One is the deceased father of one of our clergy spouses. Another is the spouse of a dedicated layperson in one of our parishes. I also held in my prayer today a new mother whose baby girl was born just this morning, Monday in Holy Week. I came to realize that as I sought to lean gently into a prayer-awareness of each person intimately affected by these times of holy transition, I was overcome by nearly overwhelming love for all who appeared in my mind's eye.

Death and life. Absence and presence. Emptiness and fullness. I also learned all over again that what we often experience at first glance as polar opposites are not so at all. Death and life as well as absence and presence are not opposites, but twins. They are a

part of one story, not different stories. We find this is so in the Gospel of John's account of Jesus' resurrection. In fact, in this Gospel, absence precedes presence (or is that presence precedes absence?).

Mary Magdalene comes upon the tomb and the stone is already removed. A kind of absence. The Lord has been taken from the tomb Mary says. Again, absence. Even when she reports that "we do not know where they have laid him," her unknowing is another kind of absence. Then Peter and the other disciple arrive at the absence, but Peter, as the account goes, hesitates before the absence as he gazes in from the outside upon the remnants of the neatly arranged linen burial clothes. They would only hint at presence in the midst of absence.

But look at Mary Magdalene – thanks be to God for her! She dares to return to the absence and through the splendid lens of her tears, a prism of her soul, recognizes two angels occupying the absence. The only conclusion to which I can come is that her heart had been nurtured by absence, which became a longing that enabled her to recognize Jesus in the beckoning gardener when he spoke. Love drew her there.

What we discover here is that absence is just as full of love as presence, or at least it can be. The presence of the fullness of God can be recognized in all things, all the gardeners of the world as well as all the gardens, in all of the pain of the world as well as its beauty. And what we discover, perhaps most of all, is that death can never again be the end of the story.

Praise God who brings light out of darkness, life out of death, and newness out of the stale and moribund. Alleluia! Christ is risen!


As *Crossways* goes to press before the end of the month, the financial information below is for the most recent completed month. In this case, it's the month of February or 16.66% through the year.



REPAYMENT OF THE UNIFIED INVESTMENT FUND (UIF) UNRESTRICTED RESERVE FUND

In 2012 All Saints' used \$30,000 from its Unrestricted Reserve Fund held as part of the Diocesan Unified Investment Fund (UIF). The Vestry is committed to restoring the \$30,000 as quickly as possible. As a result, funds received towards this purpose and towards Rebuilding All Saints' (RAS), will be transferred to the Unrestricted Reserve Fund monthly. In February 2013, \$6,530.97 was transferred to the Unrestricted Reserve Fund. In March 2013, \$1,650 was transferred into the UIF Unrestricted Reserve Fund. This brings the total amount restored to the Unrestricted Reserve Fund up to \$ 8,180.97





Knit Three, Purl Three, Knit Three: Repeat Seven Times

Sound Greek to you? It probably does unless you are a knitter. For the above title is the pattern for a basic "Prayer Shawl." The making of a "Prayer Shawl" is a spiritual practice which embodies thoughts and prayers for the receiver. It is a gift freely given with no strings attached. Made in prayer, as prayer, for prayer, the shawls are passed on hand-to-hand and heart-to-heart.

All Saints' gives out "Prayer Shawls" to shut-ins and others who may be undergoing difficult times. Putting a price on a "Prayer Shawl" defeats the purpose of this ministry. Although the shawls aren't sold, a donation is gratefully accepted for those displayed on the case by the Library, if you wish one. Of course, one can always simply ask for one and it will be freely given.

Who makes the "Prayer Shawls?" The Rector and a few friends of All Saints' are the current knitters and/or crocheters of the "Prayer Shawls." Want to help with this ministry? Here you go—several patterns: here are two different patterns:

From Knitting Into The Mystery: A Guide to the Prayer Shawl Knitting Ministry (Jorgensen & Izard)

- Use size 11 or 13 needles, circular ones are less bulky, #11's give a tighter stitch, #13 gives a lacier stitch
- 3 skeins of "Homespun Yard" by Lion Brand: ball weight 6 oz or 185 yards
- 1. Cast on 63 stitches
- 2. Knit 3, Purl 3, Knit 3 (each row begins and ends with Knit 3) This is the "Trinity" stitch—3k-3p-3k!
- 3. Continue on as above through 2 skeins. Before beginning third skein, wind enough yard around 3X5 or 4X6 card to make 126 pieces of fringe and reserve.
- 4. Join third skein and finish knitting and purling the shawl and cast off.
- 5. Finish off by attaching 63 pieces of 2 ½ inch or 3 inch fringe to each end by pulling doubled fringe thread through cast-off or cast-on stitched into a slip knot.

From the late Caroline Labosky, from Elizabeth Rybicki Episcopal Church of the Good Shepherd, A Prayer Shrug (Shawl with Cuffs!)

- Use size 11 or 13 needles.
- 2 skeins of worsted weight yard (6 oz 4 ply) or less if using "Homespun Yarn"
- 1. Cast 28 (30, 32) stitches
- 2. Knit 2, Purl 2 for as many rows as is comfortable for a cuff
- 3. Change to garter stitch (straight knit) and increase 1 stitch at the beginning of each row until one has a total of 44 (46, 48) total stitches.
- 4. Knit to desired length (try on to measure)
- 5. Decrease 1 stitch at the beginning of each row until there are 28 (30, 32) stitches remaining.
- 6. Knit 2, purl 2 for as many rows as the first cuff (2. Above)
- 7. Bind off and stitch up cuffs

Good Shepherd Crochet Pattern Prayer Shawl from Elizabeth Rybicki

- For worsted yarn use size K hook; For tight Homespun use size N; for looser Homespun use size P
- 3 skeins of "Homespun Yard" by Lion Brand: ball weight 6 oz or 185 yards or worsted yard to equal 360+ yards
- 1. Chain 63 stitches
- 2. Chain 1, turn, crochet half-double crochet in the back of each loop across the row
- 3. Chain 2, turn, repeat half double into each stitch row until desired length is obtained, approximately 5 feet long.
- 4. Finish with fringe or crochet edging as desired

Projects that the committee is already pursuing include the following:


- expanding password protected WiFi capability throughout the church building so that computers, tablets and smart phones may access the Internet during meetings and presentations; approved by vestry
