May 4, 2016, Feast of Monnica, Mother of Augustine of Hippo, 387

Dear Friends in Christ,



There are many cartoons and even jokes which tease about the problems Mary may have had raising her son Jesus. One could almost use the same ones about the relationship of Monnica and her son, Augustine of Hippo, the great theologian. She's a fitting holy woman for Mothers' Day! If you've read any of his *Confessions*, you know that it probably was not easy raising Augustine to be a Christian. As the *Holy Women, Holy Men* states, "In [Augustine's] restless search for truth, he was attracted by Manichaeism and Neo-Platonism and was constantly engaged in an inner struggle with his personal morals." (*Holy Women, Holy Men*, page 544) "Inner struggle with his personal morals," is certainly an understatement of his libertine lifestyle.


Nevertheless, Monnica finally prevailed and Augustine was baptized at age 32 by Ambrose of Milan, another theologian and Doctor of the Church. Four years later, as Monnica, Augustine and his brother prepared to return home to Africa, she died at the port of Ostia. Just before she died she told her sons, "It does not matter where you bury my body. Do not let that worry you. All I ask of you is that, wherever you may be, you should remember me at the altar of the Lord...Nothing is far from God, and I have no fear that he will not know where to find me when he comes to raise me to like at the end of the world." (*Holy Women, Holy Men*, page 358). Just how Augustine could have resisted the strong faith of his mother until he was 32 is remarkable.

But Augustine of Hippo never looked back. Upon his return to Hippo in 391 he was chosen by the people of Hippo to be their priest. Four years later he was chosen to be bishop of Hippo. In addition to his *Confessions*, *The City of God*, Augustine wrote countless treatises, letter and sermons. He is generally regarded as the greatest theologian of Western Christianity. He owes it all to Monnica!

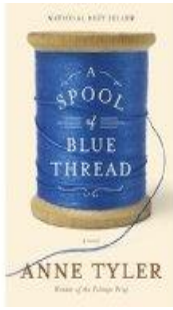

BOOK CLUB TO MEET MAY 25th AT 5:30 PM READING: A SPOOL OF BLUE THREAD BY ANNE TYLER

Due to busy schedules and illness, the Book Club did not meet in April. Therefore, we will meet next on Wednesday, May 25th at 5:30 pm at the Rectory. We are reading Anne Tyler's new novel, *A Spool of Blue Thread*. The book has been nominated for the Mann Booker Award.

Here's the publisher's blurb:

"It was a beautiful, breezy, yellow-and-green afternoon. . ." This is how Abby Whitshank always begins the story of how she fell in love with Red that day in July 1959. The Whitshanks are one of those families that radiate togetherness: an indefinable, enviable kind of specialness. But they are also like all families, in that the stories they tell themselves reveal only part of the picture. Abby and Red and their four grown children have accumulated not only tender moments, laughter, and celebrations, but also jealousies, disappointments, and carefully guarded secrets. From Red's father and mother, newly arrived in Baltimore in the 1920s, to Abby and Red's grandchildren carrying the family legacy boisterously into the twenty-first century, here are four generations of Whitshanks, their lives unfolding in and around the sprawling, lovingly worn Baltimore house that has always been their anchor.

Brimming with all the insight, humor, and generosity of spirit that are the hallmarks of Anne Tyler's work, *A Spool of Blue Thread* tells a poignant yet unsentimental story in praise of family in all its emotional complexity. It is a novel to cherish."

Episcopal Relief & Development is supporting local church partners in Texas and Ecuador as they respond to recent disasters. In Texas, as much as 20 inches of rain fell overnight on April 17-18 in northern and northwestern parts of Harris County, affecting the city of Houston and surrounding areas. The flooding has killed eight people, flooded more than 1,100 homes and caused upwards of \$5 billion in damage. In

Ecuador, at least 570 people have died and 155 are reported missing following a 7.8-magnitude earthquake centered off the coast on April 16. Ecuador's Risk Management Office says that more than 7,000 people are injured and 25,000 are taking refuge in emergency shelters. Please

Have you ever thought to yourself I would like to help but I really don't know what I can do? Well, here you go a list of the many different tasks that it takes to make a barbecue happen. If you think you could.....

- Place or hang a flyer! i.e. – at club, place of employment another place you volunteer.
- If you can distribute a flyer, see Linda Barkman or Barbara Freed or Matt Labosky
- Bake cookies, cup cakes, goodies for the Bake Sale
- Stack cinder blocks
- Bring buckets up from the kitchen

- Place chicken halves in buckets and bring to pit

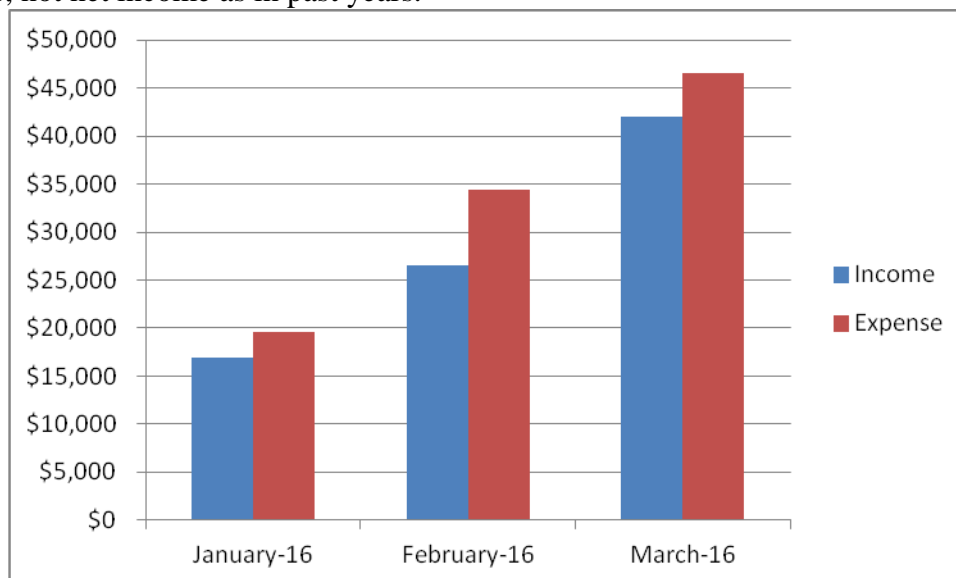
DOLLAR\$&CENTS APRIL 2016 FOR MARCH 2016

All Saints' 2016 budget—it is not a balanced budget. It is once again a “faith-based” budget. In other words, it will require faith to create \$14,524 more income for 2016 for operating expenses than budgeted. The need for \$ 14,524 in “Faith Income” for 2016 is primarily due to pledge income remaining flat and expenses which have increased about 6%. (Compare 2016 with 59 pledges for a total of \$129,454 to 2015 with 56 pledges for a total of \$126,226). In 2016 a monthly income of \$15,506 will be needed to balance the expenses.

As *Crossways* goes to press before the most recent monthly bank statements and parish financial statements are prepared, “Dollars & Cents” provides information for the previous month: in this case March 2016. Please try to keep up your pledges. It really helps All Saints’ cash flow. Better yet, make a gift to “faith income!” Truly, with “God all things are possible” (Mt. 19:26)

**SEARCH FOR THE
ELEVENTH BISHOP OF
CENTRAL NEW YORK
UPDATE...
Four Candidates Nominated
for Position of Eleventh Bishop
of the Diocese of
Central New York**

Syracuse, NY, May 2, 2016: The Standing Committee of the Episcopal Diocese of Central New York has announced a slate of four candidates for the position of 11th Bishop of the Diocese, succeeding the Right Rev. Gladstone B. “Skip” Adams, who is retiring after 15 years of service. A bishop serves as the chief priest and pastor of a diocese (geographic district of The Episcopal Church).

The candidates are:

- **The Very Rev. Dr. DeDe Duncan-Probe** (Rector, St. Peter's in the Woods Episcopal Church; Fairfax Station, Diocese of Virginia)
- **The Rev. Canon Debra Kissinger** (Canon for Transition Ministries and Leadership Development, Episcopal Diocese of Indianapolis; Diocese of Indianapolis, Indiana)
- **The Rev. Noah H. Evans** (Rector, Grace Episcopal Church; Medford, Diocese of Massachusetts)
- **The Rev. Nora Smith** (Rector, The Church of St. Barnabas (Episcopal); Irvington, Diocese of New York)

The slate was announced after a nationwide search by the Search Committee. The diocese will elect the next bishop at a special electing convention on August 6, 2016 at the Holiday Inn in Liverpool, New York. The consecration of the bishop-elect is tentatively scheduled for December 3, 2016 at the Holiday Inn in Liverpool, New York.

“We are delighted with this strong slate of candidates, any one of whom would be capable of leading our diocese into the future,” said the Rev. Christine J. Day, president of the Standing Committee, which oversees the election process.

“They have all undergone extensive interviews, background checks and reference checks,” the Search Committee chair, the Rev. Carrie Schofield-Broadbent, said. “Our committee has been working since last summer to develop a rich pool of candidates, get to know them and help them get to know our diocese. We think the people of the diocese will be pleased at the rich experience these candidates offer and their deep desire to be part of our lives here in Central New York.”

A petition process, during which additional candidates may come forward, opens on May 2, 2016 and runs through May 9, 2016. Information about the petition process is available at <http://bishopcny.org>.

Candidates will engage in a series of meet-and-greet sessions, called "walkabouts," at four locations in the Diocese. Walkabouts allow members of the Diocese to learn more about the candidates.

Thursday, July 21, 5:00-10:00 p.m., at Saints Peter & John Church in Auburn

Saturday, July 23 at St. Paul's Church in Owego (note: time for this meeting will be announced at a later date. Tentative time is 5:00-10:00 p.m.)

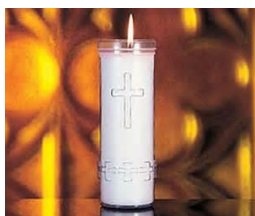
