Dear Friends in Christ,

My seminary, GTS, had two hymns which were used at all important occasions: Hymn 521 "Put forth, O God, thy Spirit's might" with the hymn tune *Chelsea Square* and Hymn 382 "King of glory, King of peace" with the hymn tune *General Seminary*.¹ Hymn 521 is GTS' "fight song." It gets one's blood moving and one feels like marching right out the door, in Jesus' name, of course.

But Hymn 382 is quite different. It's a love poem to God written by George Herbert (1593-1633). George Herbert was born into an artistic and wealthy family and attended Trinity College, Cambridge. He was ordained in 1626 and was rector of the parishes of St. Peter's, Fugglestone and St. Andrew's, Bemerton. He wrote one book, a guide to rural ministry, *A Priest in the Temple or the Country Parson*. His collection of poetry, *The Temple*, was published after his death from consumption by his friend Nicholas Ferrar (feast day December 1st, the founder of the religious community, Little Gidding). Hymn 382 is taken from three of the seven stanzas of the poem "Praise" from *The Temple*. It is a wonderful hymn, poem, to meditate on as March begins with the Last Sunday of Epiphany which All Saints' celebrates with all the joy of Mardi Gras and Carnivale, continues with Ash Wednesday and the solemn season of Lent:

King of glory, King of peace, I will love thee;
And that love may never cease, I will move thee.
Thou has granted my request, thou has heard me;
Thou didst note my working breast, thou hast spared me.

Wherefore with my utmost art, I will sing thee;
And the cream of all my heart, I will bring thee.
Though my sins against me cried, thou didst clear me;
And alone, when they replied, thou didst hear me.

Seven whole days, not one in seven, I will praise thee;
In my heart, though not in heaven, I can raise thee.
Small it is in this poor sort to enroll thee;
E'en eternity's too short to extol thee.



A MARDI GRAS CELEBRATION OF THE LAST SUNDAY OF EPIPHANY ON SUNDAY, MARCH 3rd AND A CHILI COOK OFF!

ASH WEDNESDAY IS MARCH 6TH!!!

Sometimes Easter is in March and other times it is in April. As the *Book of Common Prayer, 1979 (BCP)* so eloquently states on page 880, “Easter Day is always the Sunday after the full moon that occurs on or after the spring equinox on March 21, [a date which is fixed in accordance with an ancient ecclesiastical computation, and which does not always correspond to the astronomical equinox]. This full moon may happen on any date between March 21 and April 18 inclusive. If the full moon falls on a Sunday, Easter Day is the Sunday following. But Easter Day cannot be earlier than March 22 or later than April 25.” Clear as mud, right? This year Easter is April 21st and Ash Wednesday is March 6th.

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of the Season of Lent. Lent is a season of preparation leading up to Easter. It is the forty days plus the six Sundays before Easter. For centuries, it has been observed as a special time of self-examination and penitence. Lent is a time for concentration on fundamental values and priorities, and is not a time for self-punishment. Throughout Lent, the worship services of the church take on a simpler tone, appropriate to this season. The word “Alleluia” is not used in the words of the liturgy or hymns. These practices help the worshipping community to mark this season of renewal as a special time in the Church year.

The first day of Lent is marked with a special liturgy. The theme for the day, though not for all of Lent, is that we stand as sinners condemned to die, but for God’s grace. This is symbolized by the imposition of ashes on the forehead, with the words, “You are dust and to dust you shall return.” In the Old Testament, ashes were a sign of penitence (feeling regretful at offenses) and mourning. Ash Wednesday is one of two days of special observance (the other being Good Friday) for which fasting is recommended. While this usually refers going without food for the entire day, this practice is not practical for all persons, including, but not limited to, diabetics, the elderly and those with medical conditions. Use your own discretion in determining how you can best observe this day.


On Ash Wednesday, March 6th, there will be three celebrations of Holy Eucharist with Imposition of Ashes:

7:00AM
10:00AM
7:00PM

In the words of that day’s liturgy, you are invited “in the name of the Church, to the observance of a holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, and fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God’s holy Word.” (*BCP* pages 265).



LENTEN PROGRAM--*ENTERING THE PASSION OF JESUS*: THURSDAYS IN LENT BEGINNING ON MARCH 7th AT 5:00 PM;



Part of the “invitation to a holy Lent” on Ash Wednesday asks Christians to consider observing Lent by self-examination and repentance, by prayer and fasting and self-denial, and by reading and meditating on God’s holy Word. One can do all of the above by attending this year’s Lenten Program: *Entering the Passion of Jesus* on Thursdays in Lent beginning March 7th at 5 pm. Each session begins with a Taize Holy Eucharist in the Chapel after which everyone moves to the Library for a simple soup and bread supper and the program. Copies of the book, *Entering the Passion of Jesus* cost \$12.00.

Jesus’ final days were full of risk. Every move he made was filled with anticipation, danger, and the potential for great loss or great reward.

Jesus risked his reputation when he entered Jerusalem in a victory parade. He risked his life when he dared to teach in the Temple. His followers risked everything when they left behind their homes or anointed him with costly perfume. We take risks as we read and re-read these stories, finding new meanings and new challenges.

In *Entering the Passion of Jesus: A Beginner’s Guide to Holy Week*, author, professor at Vanderbilt University Divinity School, and biblical scholar Amy-Jill Levine explores the biblical texts surrounding the Passion story. She shows us how the text raises ethical and spiritual questions for the reader, and how we all face risk in our Christian experience.


SOUP BOX OFFERINGS

Our Lenten special offering supports our Saturday Soup and Sandwiches Lunch Program. The number of people we serve keeps going up with a few weeks having about 70 participants. We are sure that there are many folks who have come to depend on our program. My hope is that we can again raise enough money to continue without busting the church's budget. This is how it works. Many people give something up during Lent. For example, chocolate, or between meal snacks, or their daily lottery ticket. The money saved is put into a soup box (provided by the Sunday School) and collected on Easter Day. In the narthex you will find "Soup Boxes" created by our Church School Program. 
**EASTER EGG HUNT ON EASTER



All Saints' 2019 budget is a deficit budget that will require using \$10,693 from reserves. This gap is driven by people no longer at All Saints' for various reasons such as death and moving. In 2018 there were 48 pledges for \$118,780, but for 2019, there are 45 pledges but only for \$96,812. It also assumes Total Fund Raising Goals will be achieved as they did in 2018.

In 2019 a monthly income of \$12,909 will be necessary to meet operating expense cash flow. Given All Saints' major fundraising events and fundraising income occur during May, June and November, it will be important to keep one's pledge up-to-date and to make additional gifts if possible. Otherwise your Vestry will need to approve taking more money from investments than the anticipated deficit in order to pay monthly expenses. We already have had cash flow problems the last couple of years and for 2019 it will be worse.
