Rector's Annual Report January 22, 2012 All Saints' Church, Johnson City

*"The word of the LORD came to Jonah...saying, "Get up, go to Nineveh" (Jonah 3:1)
"Immediately Jesus called them...and they followed him." (Mark 1:20)*

Jonah's first call to be a prophet of the Lord to the people of Nineveh didn't work. He wound up in the belly of the fish. His second call was extremely successful. Jonah went to the people of Nineveh, preached repentance and they repented. It was so successful that Jonah had a temper tantrum because the LORD preserved the people of Nineveh. Jesus' call to Andrew, Peter and James and John of Zebedee was so enthusiastically embraced that they just dropped their nets of fish for someone else to take care of.

Calls come in all shapes and sizes. Some are clear such as Jonah's: "Get up, go to Nineveh and proclaim my message." Other calls are a bit more obtuse: "Follow me and I will make you fish for people." (Can't you just imagine the hooks and nets necessary?) Individually we all have calls. The general call is spelled out in our Baptismal Covenant. That is to:

- Continue in the Apostles' teaching, fellowship, prayers and in the breaking of the bread;
- Persevere in resisting evil and to repent and return to the Lord;
- Proclaim the Good News of God in Christ by word and example;
- Seek and serve Christ in all persons and love one's neighbors;
- Strive for justice and peace among all people and respect the dignity of every human being.ⁱ

Then depending on each individual's gifts and talents, our calls are specific to each of us.

We also have a call as the Body of Christ, the community of faith named All Saints' in Johnson City, NY. Obviously a faith community has corporately the same call as defined by our Baptismal Covenant as we do as individual members of the Body of Christ. Yet each faith community has specific calls and ministries. Like Jonah and Jesus' disciples, All Saints' must also listen for God's call(s) and act on the call(s).

In addition to our Baptismal Covenant, All Saints' also has a mission statement which further defines our corporate call:

"We are members of the family of God who gather for prayer, worship, and service, together we commit ourselves:

- To love and care for one another; (*Caring & Sharing Taskforce*)
- To learn and grow in faith throughout our lives; (*Children & Adult Formation*)
- To share our resources in the furthering of God's work; and (*Soup & Sandwiches*)
- To serve our community and the world as God calls us. (*CHOW, ERD...*)

We, the people of All Saints', carry out our mission through the ministries of all our members."ⁱⁱⁱ

All Saints' Mission Statement states quite clearly that All Saints' call is to "serve our community and the world as God call us." Moreover the mission statement also details other ways we are called (prayer, worship, service, etc.). All Saints' call is demonstrated by everything that we do as a faith community—for example, our worship, Christian Ed programs, CHOW Pantry and Soup & Sandwiches...). Yet as a faith community within Johnson City we have and still are undergoing many changes.

What stands out at once is that we now have as many children under the age of 10 as we do seniors over the age of 88. We are a graying parish: 59% are age 52 and older. Nearly a third of our parish is age 70 and older. This means many things need to be geared for this age group—think elevator, daytime programs, events and driving. But we also have twice as many young children than the general population in Johnson City. Due to our twenty plus toddlers, All Saints' average age has dropped by 20 some years. Due to the same toddlers our average household size is now closer to 2+ than to 1! This cohort of toddlers will mean that shortly we will have to have more than one classroom of church school. It also means that those in their 20's, 30's and 40's, the smallest of the cohorts, will be doing the heavy lifting while caring for both toddlers and those of us with gray hairs. Meanwhile Johnson City has survived a devastating flood from which it will take years to rebuild and recover.

As you can see, our ecclesiastical statistics are holding steady—thanks probably to the baptisms. All of the above changes in All Saints' demographics and steady parochial statistics suggest that All Saints' should periodically review and revised our goals and dreams. To get the process started, the Vestry brainstormed and came up with a list of two dreams and four goals for 2012-2014 at the January meeting. (Trust me, we started with a much longer list and narrowed them down to two dreams and four goals!) The Vestry goals and dreams are as follows:

Dreams:

- Church self-sufficient, No worrying about budget; Excess Revenue
- Restart a Youth Group

Goals:

- Get Rebuilding All Saints' (RAS) on track and finish accessible bathroom and elevator
- Maintain and grow parish members
- Balance the budget
- An active visitor program for Shut-ins, More Eucharistic Visitors and Friendly Visitors.

Now we are at the Annual Meeting and it's time for everyone's voice to be heard and counted. These goals and dreams need to be All Saints' goals and dreams: not just the rector's or not just the vestry's goals and dreams. These dreams and goals need to be reviewed and revised by all present today. Finally, the revised goals and dreams will be reviewed and revised at the February Vestry Meeting—with the New Vestry!—in order to be implemented.

So here's the process. While I'm posting the dreams and goals from the Vestry, please turn towards your closest neighbor and brainstorm at least one goal and one dream that you can agree on. Then as each group announces their goal and dream, these new goals and dreams will also be posted. When everyone has contributed, we'll vote. You each received eight colored dots along with your bulletin. Please vote with your dots. You can use all your dots (votes) on one dream or goal or use one dot for each of the eight dreams or goals for which you wish to vote. It's your choice.

When everyone has voted, the dots will be counted...

Here are the results (votes noted)ⁱⁱⁱ

DREAMS (only two garnered sizable votes)

- Restart a Youth Group, perhaps with other churches! (24)
- Church self-sufficient, No worrying about budget; Excess Revenue (19)

GOALS (more than four with some ties)

- Get Rebuilding All Saints' (RAS) on track and finish accessible/bigger bathroom and elevator (32)
- Maintain and grow parish members—evangelize! (32)
- Programs, events, Christian Ed to keep children and young adults coming (28)
- Balance Budget (27) note: 2012 budget is balanced
- New Dishwasher (27)
- To have more publicity (27)

These dreams and goals will be presented at the February Vestry Meeting for review, revision and implementation. Looks like an exciting year to be at All Saints!



6:30 AM

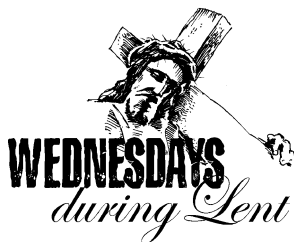
10:00 AM

"Call Him Savior" Lenten Study Begins Ash Wednesday, February 22, 2012



All Saints' Lenten Program, "Call Him Savior" begins Ash Wednesday at 5:30 PM with a soup and bread supper and discussion, prior to the 7 PM Ash Wednesday Service. In the following weeks we will gather each Wednesday during Lent at 5:30 PM in the Chapel for a Taizé Eucharist, then go the Library for a light Soup & Bread supper and the program. Each session will be led by Mother Day or District Deacon, the Rev. Dcn. Dorothy Pierce. Come, bring a copy of your Bible and discover why we call Jesus our Savior.

"Call Him Savior" examines the Revised Common Lectionary Bible readings for Lent. A key part of living and passing on the faith is to hear and remember the stories of the Lenten season. It is tempting to bypass the somber notes of Lent and rush straight from Ash Wednesday to Easter morning. "Alleluias" sing easier than "Were you there when they crucified my Lord?" Yet the impact of an empty tomb is most fully experienced when witnessed against the passion of Jesus. In this study, you are offered the opportunity to reflect on Jesus as Savior. You will remember the power and the sacrifice of God's love through the Incarnation of Jesus and His suffering and death on the cross. Celebrate the gift of salvation and new life in the resurrection and remember these stories, while reclaiming what it means to call Jesus your Savior.

Safe Church Training Offered

All Church School Teachers and Vestry need to attend Safe Church Training. St. Paul's Episcopal Church, 117 Main Street, Owego, NY, will hold a "Safe Church" training session on Sunday, February 19th, from 1:30 to 3:00 pm. This training, which covers preventing sexual abuse of children, is required every 5 years for anyone within the Episcopal Church that has any contact with children, but all are encouraged to attend. Bill & Patti O'Connell will lead the session. Participants are asked to pre-register by calling either the parish office at (607) 687-2830 or the O'Connell's at (607) 687-2493 by Feb. 16th. Participants may bring a "bag lunch". Beverages will be provided.

Immediately following the required training, the movie "Trust" will be shown, which depicts the dangers to children from on-line predators. This is an optional part of the training. Parents, especially of teens and "tweens", are encouraged to attend this showing. "Trust" is rated "R".

Thousands visit, offer prayers, watch videos on the new Episcopal Church website

Since its December 28 redesign launch, more than 55,000 have visited the Episcopal Church website 84,000 times, viewing 294,000 pages! “In less than a month, the Episcopal Church website has experienced a lot of traffic and participation,” noted Anne Rudig, Episcopal Church Director of Communication. “The response has been overwhelming and we are gratified that we are engaging newcomers and members alike. People are lingering, clicking, and viewing videos.”

The top 10 pages visited were: Find A Church ; Bulletin Inserts; live/on demand worship ; sermons; the Bible; Baptismal Covenant; I am Episcopalian; calendar; history; and the Book of Common Prayer. And, already hitting the 10,000 mark is the number of plays of the many videos offered on the site. On a daily basis, dozens of readers have submitted prayer requests, knowing that a community is praying for and with them in the section Prayers of the people. In addition, more than 300 local congregations have updated their own information in the Find a church section, which provides rapid access to Episcopal churches in the United States and the 15 other countries of the Episcopal Church. “Keeping church information updated on the website is an important evangelism tool,” Rudig continued. “Dozens of churches have taken advantage of this key element and we invite all churches to check their listing.” Key to the new website is the many opportunities for dioceses, congregations, provinces and Episcopalians to post videos and photos of local mission in action.

On December 28, the Episcopal Church unveiled the new welcoming, eye-appealing, easy-to-navigate, experiential website. The new website features a motif of stained glass windows, each of which holds a small piece of our contemporary church and provides many avenues to experience the Episcopal Church, its beliefs and its many ministries. And, the website is available in Spanish and English. Among the key features on the home page: What we believe; What we do; Who we are; Ministries; Multimedia; Calendar. New features include: Prayer for the day; Worship; Prayers of the people; Find a church; and Social media.

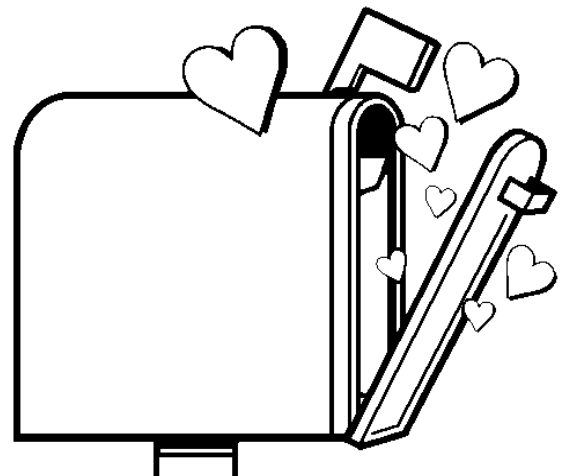
