The Feast of St. James, the Apostle

Dear Friends in Christ,

St. James, sometimes called the “Major” or the “Greater,” called by Jesus one of the “Sons of Thunder”—the other being his brother John—both being sons of Zebedee, is a good example of the adage, “Be careful of what you ask for.” One of the gospel narratives have their mother asking Jesus to place her sons one on his right hand and one on his left hand. Another gospel narrative has the two brothers arguing with the other disciples about which one of them is the greatest. “Be careful of what you ask for.” And so James became St. James the Greater because he was the first of the twelve disciples to suffer martyrdom in Jerusalem—beheaded before Passover on the order of King Herod Agrippa I in 42 AD. There just are some things in which you do not want to be first and greatest!

In June the Rev. Canon Carrie Schofield-Broadbent invited the Vestry and All Saints’ to take a “Super Big Dive” into the Learning Community Initiatives and practices and invite everyone in the parish to be part of it and the Vestry accepted the invitation. In other words, deeply diving into the questions:

- What might God be up to in our lives, at All Saints’, in Johnson City?
- What might God be saying to us?
- How do we sense God’s presence in our daily lives, in our workplaces and in our neighborhood?
- What does God care about in our local community?
- How might God be leading our congregation to join in something God is already doing?

How do we work these questions?


- By “Dwelling in the Word” with a willingness to be shaped by what God might want to say through Scripture.
- By listening well to one another’s story and as we listen increase our capacity to hear what God might be saying to us.
- By naming God’s activity, “God Sightings”—reflecting where God might have been present in the midst of our experiences gives us a chance to join with what God is presently inviting us into.

Then once our listening is well-tuned to take as a next step “action learning experiments” that are designed to help the parish “behave our way into new thinking.”

What might this look like? Take a peek at the bulletin board in the Narthex for a start, look at the pictures of God Sightings, then...

- Join the “Dwelling in the Word” Bible Study Sunday’s at 9 am in the Library;
- Look at the “Prayer Scarves” written in the past and at Carousel Day 2019 on the trellis in the Narthex;
- Use “Dwelling in the Word” with the Gospel lessons twice in July and once August in lieu of homily;
- Do Listening to Others (conversation/interview) in lieu of homily in August;
- Try doing “Prayer Scarves” at All Saints’/Christ Church Picnic;
- Take a Neighborhood Walk for “God Sightings” after church, take photos, etc;
- Walk the Neighborhood, take photos of God Sightings and invite neighborhood to the All Saints’ Community Picnic September 8th;
- Share the God Sightings from Carousel Day and the Neighborhood Walk;
- At All Saints’ Community Picnic make “Prayer Scarves” and practice “Listening to Others;”
- Sharing all of the above!

- Next Vestry meeting is August 21st at 6:30pm





READING BARBARA BROWN TAYLOR’S *HOLY ENVY***

The Book Club will meet on Thursday, August 22nd at 5:30 pm at the Rectory. Having finished Sarah Smarsh’s memoir, *Heartland: A Memoir of Working Hard and Being Broke in the Richest Country on Earth* at the July meeting, the Book Club is beginning, Barbara Brown Taylor’s *Holy Envy: Finding God in the Faith of Others*. In *Holy Envy* Barbara Brown Taylor weaves stories from her college classroom in rural Georgia with reflections on how her own spiritual journey has been complicated and renewed by connecting with people of other traditions—even those whose truths are quite different from hers. The one constant is the sense that God is calling her to change her version of God, a change that ultimately enriches her faith in other human beings and in God.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS: LEARNING COMMUNITY INITIATIVES



What's it All About?

The parish will be discerning All Saints' unique answer to this question: **“When you consider the gifts you have been given and the needs of our world, what future do you imagine God is bringing forth in our midst?”** The answer needs to come from Christ and our willingness to ask hard questions and listen for answers, as well as our ability to take risks, secure in our standing in Christ.

Learning Community Initiative is Not a Program

The Learning Community Initiative (LCI) is a process not a cookie-cutter program. A program is where one is train the do A, B, and C and the end result will be X. The Learning Community Initiative does not have a predictable end result. Instead the LCI invites one to learn to listen deeply to God in Scripture in community, to listen deeply to others in the parish and in the community and to try experiments to explore where the Spirit might be nudging us individually and as a community of faith.

What is a Learning Community?

A learning community is a group of congregations who commit to one another in a learning experience. Through prayer, skill-building, action and reflection they address their most pressing questions about the future. The experience includes the LCI Team attending three Saturday workshops and ongoing coaching calls with diocesan leaders.

How will my congregation benefit?

- Train effective lay spiritual leaders through workshops and coaching.
- Learn to discern and respond to God's leading.
- Deepen your congregation's spirituality.
- Build connections with other congregations.
- Engage and inspire your membership.
- Affirm your faith that God has a vital role for your congregation to play.

What will we be doing together?

We will be listening deeply, reflecting and sharing.

Insightful Leadership: Begin by Asking Different Questions

This first process helps equip participants to listen to God in their local contexts. Participants will dwell in Scripture together (Dwelling in the Word), share stories about what God is doing in their lives and the life of their local church (Listening to Others, Conversations with Others), and notice where God might be at work in their everyday lives (God Sightings). The goal for these practices is to help the participants begin to answer the question, “What might God be up to?”

Learn by Doing: Using Action Learning to Discover God's Leading

The second process will focus on helping participants use action learning to deepen their exploration of what they think God might be up to. The idea is to help participants “behave their way into new thinking,” rather than only trying to think their way into new behaviors. Participants will be given simple “action learning experiments” to try with others in their congregation. An example of one of these action learning experiments is the making of “Prayer Scarves” with others in our community.

Sharing Our Learning: Intentional Reflection on Our Actions

The third process will focus on learning to share what we've learned from the action learning experiments we did over the summer. Action learning requires intentional reflection on what was done so we can see what God might be teaching us!



CHOW WALK OCTOBER 6TH



Also there has been a significant drop in contributions of CHOW items. Please reconsider to determine if you can supply CHOW items as listed in the weekly announcements. Thank you.



To the clergy and parish wardens of the Diocese of Central New York:

Earlier today, Bishop DeDe Duncan-Probe sent the following letter to the clergy, wardens, and vestry of St. Mark's Church, Chenango Bridge, St. David's Church, DeWitt, the Dean of the Syracuse East District, members of the Diocesan Board and Standing Committee, the diocesan staff, our diocesan Intake Officers, our Chancellors, and our diocesan Pastoral Care Team.

To the Clergy, Wardens, and Vestry
of St. Mark's Episcopal Church, Chenango Bridge
and St. David's Episcopal Church, DeWitt

Dear friends,

I am writing to inform you that a lawsuit was filed this week against the Episcopal Diocese of Los Angeles. The suit contains allegations of sexual misconduct by the Rev. Paul Kowalewski, a priest who served in our diocese from 1990 to 2005. The abuse is alleged to have taken place in Buffalo in the 1970s, when the Rev. Kowalewski was preparing to be a priest in the Roman Catholic Church. Media have also reported that an additional lawsuit may be filed against the Roman Catholic Diocese of Buffalo, alleging that the Rev. Kowalewski sexually abused a minor, also in the 1970s.

There is no record of any allegations of sexual misconduct against Kowalewski during his tenure in our Diocese of Central New York. The Rev. Kowalewski was received as a priest in The Episcopal Church by the Diocese of Central New York in 1990. He served as the rector of St. Mark's Episcopal Church, Chenango Bridge (July 1990 to August 1993), rector of St. David's Episcopal Church, DeWitt (September 1993 to January 2002), Dean of the Diocesan School for Ministry (September 1999 to January 2002), and as Canon Visionary for the Diocese (January 2002 to September 2005). He is currently canonically resident in the Episcopal Diocese of Los Angeles and has been suspended from ministry by the bishop of that diocese pending an investigation of these complaints.

The Episcopal Diocese of Central New York takes clergy misconduct complaints very seriously and we are committed to ensuring the safety of all people in our congregations and diocesan programs. We

cooperate fully with civil authorities in all investigations related to criminal sexual misconduct, and require all clergy, church employees, and volunteers to participate in Safe Church training to protect children and adults from sexual abuse and misconduct.

Our diocesan Safe Church policies are available at cnyepiscopal.org/safechurch. If you or anyone you know is aware of any violation of these policies, including any violation related to the allegations against the Rev. Kowalewski, there is a process in place to support you and to investigate and respond to clergy misconduct complaints. I encourage you to contact any of our three diocesan Intake Officers:

In addition to our Intake Officers, who handle clergy misconduct complaints in accordance with the canons of The Episcopal Church, we also have a Pastoral Care Team of professional clinicians. They are available to provide counseling and pastoral care to victims of sexual abuse and misconduct at no cost. Any of our three Intake Officers can make a referral to this team.

Our commitment to Jesus' Way of Love is reflected in all that we do, especially in the sacred work of safeguarding the most vulnerable members of our community. Please join me in praying for all who have been affected by sexual abuse, exploitation, or harassment in our Church. Please pray also for our diocesan leaders as we work to respond to this suffering. Working together, may we truly establish a safe and healthy church.

The Commission on Ministry of the Diocese of Central New York offers a Fall Ministry Discernment Day on September 14, 2019.




