March 26, 2020, Lesser Feast of Harriet Monsell (1811-1883),
Founder of the Order of St. John the Baptist

Dear Friends in Christ,

Founding Mother Superior Harriet Monsell of the Order of St. John the Baptist died on Easter Sunday, March 25th in 1883. Mother Harriet and her order worked with marginalized women—prostitutes, unwed mothers, those orphaned or widowed or homeless and abandoned—of England and through the Cholera Epidemics of 1832, 1849, 1854, and 1866. It was in the 1866 Epidemic that William Farr, using the work of physician John Snow, identified the Broad Street Water pump's handle as the source of the Cholera and eventually ended the transmission of the disease. Mother Harriet and the sisters of St. John the Baptist are role models for us today in the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic. Throughout four epidemics of Cholera they were the Church: their ministry and mission continued. And so, can we.

It is scary and it seems that everything has changed. As the Body of Christ on our corner of Second Street in Johnson City we are used to gathering together, hearing God's Word, praying together, being fed the Sacraments and then being sent out into the world to do the work God has given us to do. Now we are only able to gather electronically—by phone and computer; we can hear God's word and liturgy by the same electronic means; we are praying likewise electronically; we are being fed through spiritual communion,* again electronically; but still being sent out, at least to the front and back Third Street doors gloved and masked, to feed our neighbors using the CHOW Pantry and Soup & Sandwiches Saturdays Lunch and to proclaim the Good News of God in Christ by our actions.

The feeling of fear is real. We're human. Just think about Jesus' first disciples and closest friends. After his arrest, they all fled. Only the beloved disciple, Jesus' mother and Mary Magdalene were at the cross with him. The rest were locked in the Upper Room. In Mark's Gospel on the first day of the week, after the angel tells them that Jesus has been raised, Mark 16:8, "They went out and fled from the tomb, for terror and amazement had seized them; and they said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid." Obviously since we have Mark's Gospel, someone must have told someone, who told someone, etc. We have a promise, Matthew 28:20, Jesus said, "And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age." It really can't get any better than that!

**Apostle:
Bartholomew or Nathanael**

Bartholomew Nathanael, son of Talmai, lived in Cana of Galilee. His apostolic symbol is three parallel knives. Tradition says he was a missionary in Armenia. A number of scholars believe that he was the only one of the 12 disciples who came from royal blood, or noble birth. His name means Son of Tolmai or Talmai(2 Samuel 3:3). Talmai was king of Geshur whose daughter, Maacah, was the wife of David, mother of Absalom.

Bartholomew's name appears with every list of the disciples (Matthew 10:3; Mark 3:18; Luke 6:14; Acts 1:13). This was not a first name, however; it was his second name. His first name probably was Nathanael, whom Jesus called "An Israelite indeed, in whom there is no guile" (John 1:47).

The New Testament gives us very little information about him. Tradition indicates he was a great searcher of the Scripture and a scholar in the law and the prophets. He developed into a man of complete surrender to the Carpenter of Nazareth, and one of the Church's most adventurous missionaries. He is said to have preached with Philip in Phrygia and Hierapolis, also in Armenia. The Armenian Church claims him as its founder and martyr. However, tradition says that he preached in India, and his death seems to have taken place there. He died as a martyr for his Lord. He was flayed alive with knives.

FEED THE HUNGRY

Our Lenten special offering supports our Saturday Soup and Sandwiches Lunch Program. The number of people we serve keeps going up with most weeks having about 60-70 participants and a few weeks we served over 90! We are sure that there are many folks who have come to depend on our program. My hope is that we can again raise enough money to continue without busting the church's budget.

This is how it works. Many people give something up during Lent. For example, chocolate, or between meal snacks, or their daily lottery ticket. The money saved is put into a soup box (provided by the Sunday School) and collected on Easter Day. In the narthex you will find "Soup Boxes" created by our Church School Program. All monies collected go toward the funds used to provide lunches every Saturday.

SOUP AND SANDWICH SATURDAYS LUNCH

Just to keep everyone up to date, Soup and Sandwich and CHOW continue to be open. As we are considered to be essential services, we will maintain our mission to provide for the hungry and disadvantaged as long as we have volunteers to do so.

S&S had its first takeout meal this past Saturday. Linda Barkman and her team of saints made food for over 50 people. Each lunch included soup, two sandwiches, fresh and/or canned fruit and a brownie. We served drive through guests at the back door, and people who walked or bused in at the 3rd street door. THE HOLY SACRAMENTS

No, Easter is not cancelled. The Church's liturgical calendar roars right on: pandemic or no pandemic. When we are eventually able to gather together in person, we will celebrate an Easter Liturgy together—after all every Sunday or Vigil for a Sunday is a celebration of Our Lord's Resurrection!

So, Palm Sunday, Holy Week and Easter will be different this year. As per the Bishop's Directive we are not able to meet, gather, worship in person. (See March 14th Directive mailed out with the Rector's Letter) But thanks to the telephone, computers, digital platforms such as Zoom and Facebook Live, we can meet and worship electronically. First if you are not digitally connected, about 6 people at a time can connect with Deacon Dorothy's phone for to listen to a

worship service. Just let Mother Chris or Deacon Dorothy know and they will call you and connect you. We just ask that you "mute" your end so that there is no feedback or delayed responses.

If the Rector can climb up further on the digital learning curve, it may also be possible to use a landline to phone into a Zoom service and listen. As of press time she has not mastered this and many parishes that tried to do this the weekend of March 22nd and most crashed...

WHAT IS A SPIRITUAL COMMUNION?*

When we can't gather and take communion there's a spiritual Communion. A spiritual communion is a personal devotional that anyone can pray at any time to express their desire to receive Holy Communion at that moment, but in which circumstances impede them from actually receiving Holy Communion.

Since I cannot now receive you sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart. BOOK CLUB TO MEET DIGITALLY BY ZOOM ON APRIL 22nd AT 5:30PM

Rather amazingly the Book Club met by Zoom on Wednesday March 25th and finished *Ida B. Wells: Passionate for Justice*. Therefore, it's time for a new book. There are two on the docket: *Olive, Again: A Novel* by Elizabeth Strout and/or *The Dutch House* by Ann Patchett. At present the Book Club is voting on which one to read. Here are the publishers' blurbs:

Olive, Again: A Novel (e-format \$13.99; hardcover \$15.66) She's baaaaack. Elizabeth Strout's 2008 novel, *Olive Kitteridge*, won the Pulitzer Prize and spawned a hit HBO miniseries starring Frances McDormand and Bill Murray. In *Olive, again* she resurrects the endearing curmudgeon from Crosby, Maine in thirteen interconnected stories that remind us that you're never too old to grow up. As the book opens, Olive is being wooed, in a manner of speaking, by fellow widow Jack Kennison. Even he is at a loss to explain the precise reasons for his affection for her, but as we see Olive fumbling through everyday life—still grappling with its disappointments and mysteries—we recognize a kindred soul. Olive again is not what you would call a page-turner. There are the none of the requisite heart-racing moments, but a steady beat of ordinary magic (which ends up being not so ordinary at all).

The Dutch House (e-format \$14.99; hardcover \$19.69) The best authors make the pages they write come to life: their words and characters shimmer with authenticity, motivation, and desire. The story can be simple or complex, familiar or otherworldly, but without connection, it is nothing. In Ann Patchett's eighth novel, *The Dutch House*, everyone and

everything bustles with vitality. It is a story about the interminable bond between siblings and it is an absolute joy to read. The novel follows a brother and sister who grow up in a fairy tale—a huge house, a loving father, and a caring staff. The only thing that's missing is their mother, who had a more fraught existence, and fled the pressures of managing the household when they were young. When their father dies and leaves his fortune to their stepmother, the kids are left to fend for themselves, going on to live a drastically different life than they had imagined. The house of their youth haunts them through adulthood, and revenge is their desire—but not in the way you imagine. *The Dutch House* is moving and thoughtful—a quietly brilliant novel that has quickly become a favorite.

Who Should Be Trained?

All members of our churches are encouraged to participate in Safe Church Training. The more informed and aware we are, the safer our churches will be for all children and adults.

Individuals who complete the three-hour Safe Church Training workshop are awarded a certificate. Certification is valid for five years and may be renewed by attending the workshop again or completing Safeguarding Online. The following individuals are required to have up-to-date Safe Church certificates:

- Clergy
- Vestry members
- Parish employees
- Worship Leaders, Lay Ministers & Eucharistic Visitors
- Anyone volunteering or working with children in any capacity

All Youth Leaders under the age of 16 are **required to attend [Safe Church for Teens training](#) annually**, and all youth in the Diocese are encouraged to take this training.


