

If you call in, dial 1-646-558-8656 then follow the prompts for the meeting ID, password, etc.

ADVENT STUDY ADAM HAMILTON'S *INCARNATION* BEGINS SUNDAY NOVEMBER 29th AT 6:00 PM BY ZOOM

Charles Dickens' novel, *The Tale of Two Cities* set in the 18th century begins with the line, "It was the best of times, it was the worst of times..." It works for 2020 and it worked for Palestine in the 1st century. So, this Advent consider joining the ZOOM Advent Study, *Incarnation: Rediscovering the Significance of Christmas* on Sundays in Advent beginning Advent1, November 29th at 6 pm. Unlike previous Advent Studies we will not begin each session with a simple soup and bread supper, nor will we end with a liturgy in the Chapel. But we

will gather by ZOOM, watch a video led by Adam Hamilton, enter into discussions about scripture, Jesus, his birth, and his names and pray together.

Best-selling author Adam Hamilton writes about his new Advent Study:

"His parents gave him the name Jesus. But the prophets, the shepherds, the wise men, and the angels addressed him by other names. They called him Lord, Messiah, Savior, Emmanuel, Light of the World, and Word Made Flesh...[Together we'll] examine the names of Christ used by the gospel writers, exploring the historical and personal significance of his birth. This Advent season church families will come together to remember what's important. In the face of uncertainty and conflict, Christians reclaim the Christ child who brings us together, heals our hearts, and calls us to bring light into the darkness. Now more than ever, we invite you to reflect upon the significance of the Christ child for our lives and world today!"

This is an Advent Study that was designed for ZOOM gatherings. The video will be able to be seen on your computer, tablet, or smart phone. It also uses the resource of Amplifymedia.com site so that if Sundays at 6:00 pm doesn't work for you can still watch the video on your own time.

"DWELLING IN THE WORD" CONTINUES DURING ADVENT AND CHRISTMAS ON SUNDAYS AT 9:00 AM BY ZOOM

Looking to do something different this Advent? Consider joining the "Dwelling in the Word" Bible Study on Sundays at 9:00 am by ZOOM. "Dwelling in the Word" is a way of spiritually listening to the text as one-way God speaks to us, with a willingness to be shaped by what God might want to say through the Scripture. Throughout Advent, Christmas, and the beginning of the season of Epiphany we are "dwelling" with the Prologue to John's Gospel: John 1:1-18 in a variety of translations. Portions of the Prologue are part of the lectionary readings for Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany.

Here's the process:

- Pray for insight.
- Read the passage aloud slowly and pause for reflection.
- Read the passage slowly again and pause for reflection.
- Then share as the Spirit moves you

As we listen to the Scripture we think about:

- What caught your attention, what shimmered for you or what touched your heart?
- What question(s) you would want to ask?
- What are we hearing? Where might the Spirit be nudging me or All Saints'?

Financial Report from Budget & Finance Committee

The All Saints Budget & Finance Committee met this week via Zoom to begin deliberations on the 2021 Budget. It was NOT a very cheery experience, as we have a revenue shortfall of approximately \$28,000.



For all of you that have already submitted pledges for next year (32), "Thank You"! There are potentially about 15 pledges that have not yet been received from parish members who pledged this year. That dollar amount would amount to about \$15,000 if everyone pledged for 2021 at the 2020 rate. That additional commitment from you would cut the budget gap by almost half, leaving us with a task of finding additional revenues or further cutting costs, or a combination of both methods.

Please pray for our All Saints ministry, and if possible, complete and submit a pledge for next year. Any other ideas for helping to balance the budget would also be appreciated.

Hello Fellow Parishioners,

I would like to report on the status of the fall Stewardship Campaign. As of November 18th, we have received 31 pledges totaling a little over \$78,000. Thank you to everyone who has sent in a pledge card. Of course, you may also ask for envelopes without pledging. Tom Johnson reported at last night's Budget and Finance Committee meeting that there are still 15 possible pledges from people who pledged in 2020 who have not yet pledged for 2021.

As I said in last month's *Crossways*, I realize with the current situation, it may be tough for some people to decide what to do. If you can find a way to pledge, it would be helpful to the Committee so that we might be able to present a budget to the Vestry at their December meeting. If you need a new card, call the office and Linda Barkman can send you another. The budget figures can be revised as pledges come in. This will better reflect our situation for 2021. So, if you can send in your pledge card soon, I would greatly appreciate it. A member of the Vestry may call you to remind you. Personally, I came away from the meeting somewhat discouraged after seeing the preliminary projections for income and expenses.

I would also ask anyone who pledged in 2020, to look to see what you have already given, and if you are behind, please catch up by the end of this year. Remember, money given after December 31 will be counted for the year 2021.

SOUP AND SANDWICH CONTINUES

Soup and Sandwich continues to provide for those who come to our doors week by week. Since COVID began we have seen our numbers rise from about 60 served to now an average around 100. We continue to get some of our food from CHOW, but there are many things they do not provide for us. One of the biggest is all the disposable products necessary to serve strictly takeout. Because of this, the cost of each weeks' meal averages \$100. As of the beginning of October we have spent a \$1,000 more than the beginning of October 2019. Thanks to memorial contributions and some generous donors we still can continue to serve. I ask one and all to offer prayers for our program. Pray also for those who not only give up their time, but also volunteer for his essential service regardless of any potential risk.

Silver Bells Christmas Gift program for Senior Citizens



Thank you for your interest in this year's Silver Bells program. Last year, your participation was instrumental to our success, and we were able to provide 100+ gifts and lots of Christmas cheer to local senior citizens.

As you know, this year is not a typical year. However, we strongly feel that now, more than ever, older adults need to feel connected. COVID-19 has increased the isolation of many older adults and we would like this program to be a reminder that they are loved this holiday season.

Considering the pandemic, we

have been working on ways to make sure we are doing everything we can to ensure the safety of all involved.

1. We are not distributing gift tags. We will be using an online software tool called Sign Up Genius (https://www.signupgenius.com/).

- This tool will allow us to make lists for your congregation to access online, see what gifts have not been taken and chose the gift they would like to purchase. When they "sign up", it is visible to all others which senior is taken and what gifts are left.
- If you are concerned that some of your congregation does not utilize the Internet, we will be happy to discuss some ideas how you can adapt to make it accessible to those church members.
- Because we will not have tags, shoppers will need to make sure to identify who the gift is for.

2. We will not be using volunteers to wrap presents this year. Our staff (4 people) will be the only ones handling the gifts before delivery. This will greatly reduce the amount of personal contact with the gifts.

- We will only be using gift bags this year.
- Shoppers may provide a gift bag, or we will supply one.

3. The volunteers who distribute the gifts will provide delivery with as little contact as possible.

- Gifts will be left at the door. The volunteer will wait to make sure the senior takes their gift.
- Our volunteers follow CDC guidelines involving social distancing, wearing masks, and washing hands frequently.

• December $14^{th} - 18^{th} -$ Gifts will be picked up at your church

December 21 & 22 - Gifts will be delivered

We are requesting each church to take a minimum of 20 names. Please let us know if you would like to participate and the number of names you would like.

REQUEST FROM DEACON DOROTHY PIERCE: JAIL MINISTRY NEEDS FOR CHRISTMAS AND WINTER

To Our All Saints' Family,

As we approach the Christmas/Holiday season and think about our brothers and sisters who are residing at the Broome County Jail, we can be certain that this will be an extraordinary season of compassionate giving. You have always been amazingly generous in your care for the men and women who are at the jail. I am forever grateful to God and to you for your gifts, donations, prayers, and the faithful, loving thoughts you send their way. Thank you so much! We will continue to prepare gift bags to hand out close to Christmas Eve Day for every person incarcerated at the jail regardless of his or her faith background, tradition, or practice. The biggest needs are for decks of playing cards, small puzzle books, and current devotionals (small and paperback). We also pass out stamped Christmas/Holiday cards to every individual early in December so that they can send them to their family and friends. These cards should be blank and simply placed in their envelopes, unsealed, and stamped, so that each person can write a message of love and hope to people who are important to them. We like to give out 2 or more of these cards to every person in the facility. The facility has over 500 beds. You can leave these items at the church or call me at 607-624-1523, and I will pick them up at your convenience. Thank you!

We are sadly unable to collect, prepare, and deliver gifts to the children of the men and women at the jail this year because of the pandemic. Hopefully, later, we can surprise the children with gifts, which I will ask for when the time arises. We do have ongoing needs for personal hygiene items which we can accept and give out to persons as they are being released from the jail. These items may include shampoo, toothpaste, combs, deodorant, soap, and shaving items. Throughout the year, we always need sweatsuits (any sizes), socks, and underwear. All these items can be left at the church - or I will arrange to have them picked up at your home. Again, thank you so much! It is God's gift to us to be able to share with others with peace and love and hope.

I am eternally grateful for all you do to spread love and hope to the men and women at the jail. Many are lonely, feeling lost and sad, and disconnected from family and friends, especially at this time of isolation and not being able to have visits. Your gifts help to bring the love of Jesus Christ to all of them, no matter who they are, and are deeply appreciated and treasured.

As the Rev. Josephine Robertson in her blog Barefoot Theology says, "In 2020 "the way we've always done things" won't work." Because of the COVID-19 pandemic, the desire to love our neighbor as ourselves, the desire to keep everyone safe, and because there are to be no in-person worship services in the Diocese of Central New York this December, All Saints' Christmas Eve Celebration of Holy Eucharist will be livestreamed at 1:30 pm on Thursday, December 24, 2020 on ZOOM and Facebook Live. Then from 2:30 – 4:30 pm Holy Communion will be distributed to those who come to All Saints. (These times were chosen so that people would not have to necessarily drive at night!)

To receive Christmas Eve Holy Communion, think of it as a "walk-thru" rather than a "drive-thru." Please, everyone do not come at once at 2:30 pm: stagger your arrival as you are able. Please wear a mask covering your nose and mouth.

- Park your car. If you are the only car in the parking lot; you can enter the church. If there are already cars in the lot; please wait until a household comes out of the church before you enter; and
- Enter the church wearing a mask; and
- Upon entering the church, please use hand sanitizer; and
- Keep 6 feet of physical distance from others; and
- Go down the center aisle to the altar rail; and
- Receive Communion (bread) from clergy who are also masked and wearing gloves; and
- Go up the street-side aisle, choose a pew in which to sit, briefly remove mask to consume Communion; replace mask; hear a Post-Communion Prayer said, leave the nave; and
- Use hand sanitizer again; and
- Exit the church, go to your car; and leave the parking lot.

Sound like a plan? Fingers crossed! Blessed Christmas!

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ARE YOUR CHRISTMAS DECORATIONS FIRE HAZARDS?

Decorating for Christmas can be a pleasure. You create a hospitable and festive environment in which your community members can feel the spirit of the holidays.

But holiday decorations can also be fire hazards if they are not used properly (or if they have not been updated for a while). Check to make sure your decorations are safe before you display them.

Consider Age Before Beauty

Perhaps you have some beautiful old sparkling bulb lights that you have not replaced in 20 years. Or, you might have an antique ceramic Christmas tree that gets hot to the touch when you plug it in. Although these old decorations may recall wonderful memories of Christmas past, it may be necessary to retire them from display; they could be fire hazards. Look for loose wires and broken bulbs, and if any item gets hot while plugged in, unplug it. Resist the urge to use older donated decorative holiday items and consider springing for new LED lights. These lights are both less likely to catch fire and more likely to save money on your energy bill.

Watch Out for Open Flames and Real Trees

Nothing is cozier than the soft, flickering flame of candles on a cold winter's night. Maybe you have put together a Christmas display–complete with a real tree or evergreen wreaths–right next to the altar's lit candles. It looks great, and you think the placement will be fine if everyone is careful and follows basic safety rules. But that is a risk you should not take.

Boughs from real trees can dry out quickly and become tinder for fires from lit candles. Even if you try to remember to water your real tree regularly, it is still possible for it to catch fire if it is placed near open flames.

Do not take unnecessary risks for the sake of a classic Christmas decorative tableau. If you do display a real tree or items made from real trees, keep them far away from lit candles. And make sure that someone is responsible for extinguishing any candle flames when people are not present (good advice year-round).

Make a Decorations Protocol

Do not leave decorations plugged in overnight. Put out any flames before you leave the room and keep candle wicks trimmed. Make sure you have fire extinguishers in easy-to-reach places. This <u>checklist</u> can guide you as you figure out how to minimize fire hazards at a time when more people may be present at your organization—and decorations may cause additional risk. Go ahead and celebrate Christmas to the fullest! Decorate and embrace the good cheer of the season! Just make sure to consider the possibility of increased fire hazards connected to holiday decorations.

COVID CHRISTMAS*

Before all else let me say: 2020 has been an incredibly stressful and difficult year for us all. All the below is information and **suggestions**. Do what you need to do for your own mental health and well-being, stay home, stay safe.

Ok, let's talk about Advent and Christmas in a pandemic.

We'll first sort out some liturgical housekeeping: Christmas is *not* Christianity's most important feast (that's Easter). Christmas joined the Christian calendar fairly late (in the 4th century). And the *religious* observance of Advent, Christmas and Epiphany requires almost *none* of what we have come to associate with December festivities in the United States and Europe.

Christmas has (in the last 100 years or so) been given *enormous* cultural significance and weight, mostly I'm afraid because it drives consumer spending. All that *pomp* is less about religion and more about parting you from your money than you'd like to believe. We've been snookered with romantic imagery and pseudo religious messages into the juggernaut that is modern American Christmas.

It didn't have to be that way and in 2020 "the way we've always done things" won't work. This year may be the perfect time to bring some sanity back to Advent and Christmas.

Christmas wasn't celebrated in the very early church. We don't see its development until the 4th century (in Rome.) The Christmas celebrations roughly coincided with Saturnalia. Advent may have actually *predated* the Christmas feast as a fast directly in opposition to the Saturnalia debauchery and gluttony. Either way, Christmas was the joyful commemoration of the Incarnation, of God putting on human flesh and living with us. Advent was a season (it has varied from 40 days to the current roughly 4 weeks) of preparation and fasting, often emphasizing helping the poor and fasting in solidarity with them.

Christmas isn't about "togetherness" or "family." Christmas is the radical claim that the creator of all that is *gave up* power, privilege, and comfort to enter into human experience; to experience our joy, sorrow, pleasure, suffering, and even death. For us to endanger the lives of our fellow human beings, lives sanctified by the Incarnation, *for the feast of the Incarnation* is blasphemy.

Fortunately, preparing for and celebrating the feast of the Incarnation *is* something we can do authentically and well, even in the midst of a pandemic.

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Suggestions for Advent

It has been a long, stressful, and difficult year. And this holiday season (like the Easter season) will be different from past years. Don't try to recreate "normal."

Keep Advent simple and encourage your friends/family/congregants to do so as well. *Remember that Jesus' compassion was for the poor, the sick, and the hurting. Our first rule for Advent this year should be: do no harm, spread no disease.*

This liturgist and theologian suggests that we emphasize rest, service, and inner preparation this year. Here are some ideas, I don't suggest doing them *all*, pick just a few.

- Mark each week of Advent with an at home liturgy of candle lighting and prayer.
- Consider creating a "reverse Advent calendar." (Fill a box with non-perishable food items, contact your local food banks for their list of needs and how to donate them).
- Set aside time each day or week for a *simple* spiritual practice or devotional reading.
- Make a list of the people you know who may be particularly isolated right now (this includes those with disabilities, chronic health issues, the elderly, those with children, those who live alone, etc.). Make it a point to call the folks on your list at some point in Advent and just visit on the phone!
- Send Christmas cards. Remember, Christmas isn't until the 25th of December so there is no rush mailing these. Take your time and send personal greetings to people you love, write a prayer in the card if that is appropriate for that person, keep sending these right through the Christmas season. (When I send Christmas cards, I wait to mail them until Christmas Eve, so they arrive during the 12 days.)
- Set aside intentional time for *rest* each week. Schedule it on your calendar.
- *Wait*. Wait to bake the cookies, wait to hang the decorations. None of these things have to happen during Advent (and I suggest doing them during the *Christmas season*, not Advent). But if you chose to decorate in Advent do it slowly, savor it. Simplify. If the idea of what you normally do for decorations or baking seems overwhelming *don't do it*. The feast will still happen, regardless of how you have decorated (or not).
- Skip the gifts. Gifts are in no way necessary to celebrate Christmas, and in a time of economic uncertainty and a record number of people pushed into poverty, food insecurity, and homelessness the *obligation* of gift exchange runs opposite to the theological meaning of the season.
- All of that said: this has been a deeply hard and stressful year. If what you need in the darkest month is twinkle lights, ornaments, and fake snow then have at it, no guilt and no "advent police" here!

Christmas Suggestions

Christmas is a doubly weighted festival in that our dominant culture gives us messages of excessive consumer spending, overindulgence of food and drink, and paints saccharine and unrealistic expectations of family togetherness and perfection.

The church all too often follows the culture, reinforcing the "family togetherness" message. In 2020 Christmas is likely to be a time of deep loneliness and dissatisfaction as cultural and religious expectations (and traditions) run up against doing our duty to keep one another safe.

Remember that Jesus prioritized wholeness, and care for the vulnerable over everything else, *including* religious obligation *and* family ties. Jesus' heart for the vulnerable should be our guiding light through the Christmas season.

- Spend Christmas Eve doing *all* your decorating. (Until very recently this was the tradition!) Put up the tree, hang wreaths, string out lights! Have fun, savor, call up friends or family and share memories while you all decorate together.
- Do church online Christmas Eve & Christmas Day. Call in to your community's Zoom or join a livestream from anywhere in the world. We aren't bound by geography this year so take advantage of that. (You could work out with your whole family to "go" to the same service.)
- Take Christmas Day *off*. Don't get out of your PJs all day (a distinct advantage of online church). Read, eat your favorite food, play! (Enjoy the lack of stress or pressure to *be* anywhere.)
- Make plans to talk to the people you love and miss over the course of the 12 days. These might be friends, or family. Use video chat, or phone. Play a game online together, get creative in finding ways to connect.
- Now is the time for fun and excitement! Make (ahead of time) a Christmas days calendar with little treats for each day. (No need for a fancy setup, you could hang numbered packages on your Christmas tree, or make a grab bag to pull a treat from each day.) Treats might be small puzzles, games, chocolate, art supplies, riddles, Madlibs, or other silly enjoyable fun. (Remember, this doesn't have to be expensive.)
- Change up tradition, instead of "traditional" holiday meals on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day cook your household's *favorite* food. Mac & Cheese? Go for it. Burgers and tots? Why not. Plan out a special "favorite things" menu for the Christmas season. (And make donations to local feeding programs during this time.)
- Write letters, who are you missing during this season? Write them a real paper letter, put it in the mail.
- Bake. Your body is good, it bears the image of God. God became a body and seemed to enjoy it! Make yourself lovely things to eat and enjoy. Share them (safely) with people you love! Use box mixed, or from scratch, the how doesn't matter.
- Get outside. If you live in an area with snow, get out and enjoy it, even if you aren't a kid anymore. Throw some snowballs, or just wander and enjoy the scenery but a little play does us all good, try it! If you live in an area without snow? Go outside anyway! Take an evening walk and enjoy Christmas lights, wander through the woods, marvel at Creation. (Afterwards, make hot Chocolate from scratch! Boil milk (1 cup) whisk in 2 Tbsp cocoa powder and 1- 2 Tbsp sugar (to taste). Add a drop of vanilla extract, peppermint extract, marshmallows, or whipped cream for extra yum.)


