St. Mark's Day April 25, 2012

Dear Friends in Christ,

St. Mark's Day, the feast day celebrating St. Mark of the Gospel of the same name fame, is the day that my "middle" godson, William Christopher Konzen was baptized in St. Paul's Cathedral, Syracuse, NY in 1986. (I can't believe he's 26!) When I was visiting him one May, he gave me a May Day nosegay of dandelions and a creeping wild violet, wrapped in a moistened paper napkin, just as I had done to my mother many, many years ago. Like my mother before me, I thanked him for his beautiful gift. Like my mother, I never told him that dandelions close up after they are picked and that the wild violet is an invasive species because Christopher's May Day nosegay was a gift of love.

Love turned those wilting weeds into beautiful flowers. Love is like that. Weeds are not the only things that love changes into beauty. Jesus' death by crucifixion was transformed by love into the most amazing gift for humanity: the resurrection and eternal life. As John 3:16 so concisely says, "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but have eternal life."

Lent, Easter and Pentecost are all about love. During Lent we hear of how love so often challenges the powers and authorities of the world. In Easter—April 8th-May 26th this year—we hear of how the first followers of Christ were transformed by Jesus' resurrection and went to the ends of the earth proclaiming the Good News of God in Christ. On Pentecost we will celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit who continuously transforms us, the followers of Christ, and the world by love.

So this May, let us come each week to celebrate and share the love of God in Christ which transforms each of us. And let us share that love!

Rogation Celebration? Come and Join the Celebration on Sunday, May 20th at Noon at the Stoughton Farm in Newark Valley

Mark your calendars now for St. John's, Speedsville's Rogation Celebration at the Stoughton Farm in Newark Valley on May 20th at 12 noon. A dish to pass luncheon will follow the liturgy. The Rev. Richard Schaal states, "We had fun last year. Join us this year. (Buy all you Memorial Day flowers at the farm. Get your bedding plants as well!")

Originally the Rogation Days were the Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday before Ascension Day. Today it is often celebrated as Rogation Sunday, the Sunday before Ascension Day. Rogation Days originated in Vienne, France in 470 after a series of natural disasters had caused much suffering among the people. Archbishop Mamertus proclaimed a fast and ordered that special litanies and prayers be said as the population processed around their fields, asking God's protection and blessing on the crops that were just beginning to sprout. The Latin word *rogare* means "to ask", thus these were "rogation"



processions. In an agricultural society, closely connected with the soil and highly vulnerable to the uncertainties of nature, this was an idea that took root quickly, and the custom spread around Europe and over to Britain.

While technically they were days of fasting, the Rogation Days developed into a popular festival, celebrating the arrival of spring and serving other purposes, as well. In some parishes, the procession, to "beat the bounds" of the parish, took more than one day and the whole business became an occasion for several days of picnics and revels of all sorts, particularly among those who trooped along at the fringes of the religious aspects of the procession. The poet George Herbert gave the following good reasons to beat the bounds: "1) a blessing of God for the fruits of the field; 2) Justice in the preservation of the bounds; 3) Charitie, in living, walking and neighbourly accompanying one another, with reconciling of differences at that time, if they be any; 4) Mercie, in relieving the poor by a liberal distribution of largess which at that time is or ought be made." Dollars and Cents: March 2012

All Saints' 2012 budget is a balanced budget! Thanks to our parish making generous pledges! In 2012 a monthly income of \$ 14,244 will be needed to balance the expenses. Please try to keep up your pledges. Truly, with "God all things are possible" (Mt. 19:26)

As *Crossways* goes to press before the end of the month, the financial information below is for the most recent completed month. In this case, it's the month of February 2012 or about 16.6% through the year.

^{*}In the first quarter of the year there are many expenses that are either paid at the beginning of the year or at the beginning of the quarter (pension, health insurance, other insurance, etc.) that result in a temporary deficit.

In addition, All Saints' utility bills have been significantly higher than last year. Nancy Elwood who works at NYSEG looked into this. She reported that right now there is a cumulative credit in NYSEG Solutions budget of \$1674.28. So she suggested that the Treasurer call and remove both the gas and the electric from being budgeted until the fall. Applying the credit should result in no bill for May 2012.
