October 29, 2014 The Feast of James Hannington and his Companions Bishop of Eastern Equatorial Africa, Martyrs, 1885

Dear Friends in Christ,

In the days leading up to "All Hallows' Eve" (AKA Halloween) and All Saints' Day, I pause to remember the Rt. Rev. James Hannington and his companions who were martyred attempting to bring the Good News of God in Christ to Uganda. As bishop of Eastern Equatorial Africa, his mission field was the shores of Lake Victoria. Bishop



Hannington and his fellow workers were intercepted by emissaries of King Mwanga of Uganda who feared foreign colonization and proselytizing. Bishop Hannington and the remainder of his company were martyred on October 29, 1889. His last words were, "Go, tell Mwanga I have purchased the road to Uganda with my blood." Other martyrs of Uganda shared his fate before the Gospel was firmly planted in this heartland of Africa, where today the Church has a vigorous life under an indigenous ministry.¹

Bishop Hannington is one of the many "Hallows" or Saints we will celebrate this weekend All Saints' Day on Saturday, November 1st at 5 PM and All Saints' Sunday on Sunday, November 2nd at 10 AM. He's probably commemorated as, "...one was a priest," in the hymn, "I sing a song of the Saints' of God." But that hymn also reminds us that saints, "lived not only in ages past, there are hundreds and thousands still...for the saints of God are just folk like me and I mean to be one too." Come and celebrate All Saints' with, well, All Saints'!

Many of my classmates and friends on FaceBook have commented that our culture seems to be stuck in "Happy Hallogivingmas." Happy Hallogivingmas begins after Labor Day and ends December 25th. But as Christians we need not give in to this conglomeration and commercialization. We can actually use the church calendar for our mental, physical and fiscal health. First celebrate Halloween as we did at the stewardship brunch ("Trick or Treat or Tithe) on October 26th and even on October 31st. Then celebrate the Saints and all saints on November 1st and 2nd. Next celebrate the end of the church year on Christ the King weekend, November 22nd and 23rd—come and hear Deacon Dorothy talk about her time in Kenya. Then celebrate the season of preparation and contemplation, the season of Advent which begins the weekend of November 29th and 30th and which ends December 23rd. Maybe even come to the Advent program on Sundays and Thursdays or the Wednesday morning Eucharist. Finally, celebrate Christmas from December 24th-January 5th! Doesn't that sound better than Happy Hallogivingmas?

- Love All—the poor, the forgotten, the marginalized, the sick, in ways that make a difference.



Interested? Sign-up in the Narthex (so that books may be ordered and enough soup prepared) and come on Sundays or Thursdays during Advent.



Book Club to Meet Wednesday, November 26th at 5:30 PM: Reading All the Light We Can Not See.

Book Club will meet the Wednesday before Thanksgiving—take a break from all the baking!—on Wednesday, November 26, 2014 at 5:30 PM at the Rectory. We'll be discussing, All the Light We Cannot See, by Anthony Doerr, which has been named a finalist for the 2014 National Book Award in Fiction.

Here's the publisher's blurb:

"Marie-Laure lives with her father in Paris near the Museum of Natural History, where he works as the master of its thousands of locks. When she is six, Marie-Laure goes blind and her father builds a perfect miniature of their neighborhood so she can memorize it by touch and navigate her way home. When she is twelve, the Nazis occupy Paris and father and daughter flee to the walled citadel of Saint-Malo, where Marie-Laure's reclusive great-uncle lives in a tall house by the sea. With them they carry what might be the museum's most valuable and dangerous jewel.

"In a mining town in Germany, the orphan Werner grows up with his younger sister, enchanted by a crude radio they find. Werner becomes an expert at building and fixing these crucial new instruments, a talent that wins him a place at a brutal academy for Hitler Youth, then a special assignment to track the resistance. More and more aware of the human cost of his intelligence, Werner travels through the heart of the war and, finally, into Saint-Malo, where his story and Marie-Laure's converge.

"Doerr's "stunning sense of physical detail and gorgeous metaphors" (San Francisco Chronicle) are dazzling. Deftly interweaving the lives of Marie-Laure and Werner, he illuminates the ways, against all odds, people try to be good to one another. Ten years in the writing, All the Light We Cannot See is a magnificent, deeply moving novel from a writer "whose sentences never fail to thrill" (Los Angeles Times)."



All Saints' 2014 budget—it is not a balanced budget. The 2014 budget is once again a "faith-based" budget. In other words, it will require <u>faith</u> to create <u>\$10,798 more income</u> for 2014 for operating expenses than budgeted. The need for \$10,798 in "Faith Income" for 2014 is primarily due to having only 63 pledges for a total of \$134,202. Compared to the actual for 2013 of 67 pledges for \$139,194, there are 4 less pledges (64 pledges for \$134,202). Thanks to very generous people who have made special gifts totaling \$7,700 to "Faith Income," only \$3,098 in additional funds now need to be raised for "Faith Income."

In 2014 a monthly income of \$14,300 will be needed to balance the expenses. If you haven't pledged or asked for a set of envelopes, please do. Please try to keep up your pledges. It really helps All Saints' cash flow. Please consider making an extra gift towards "Faith Income." Truly, with "God all things are possible" (Mt. 19:26)
